OREGON WINS GREAT VICTORY AT SEATTLE

Made Score of 67 Out of a Possible 125 in Triangular Track Meet
Washington Makes 39 and Idaho 19
---Dan Kelly of Oregon Breaks Coast Record in 220-Yard Dash

The University of Oregon track team won a splendid victory over Washington and Idaho at the triangular meet in Seattle yesterday. The score was: Oregon, 67; Washington, 39; Idaho, 19. The Oregon team made a larger score than any one expected, but of course everybody here expected them to win the meet.
Dan Kelly, of Oregon, was the star of the meet. He won the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes, breaking the coast record in the latter, making it in 22 seconds. He was second in the broad jump, Friessell beating him, also second in the high jump.

The Guard received bulletins of the meet and scores of students thronged the sidewalk in front of the office to learn the outcome. The first bulletin gave the result of the first four events. The score then stood, Oregon, 16; Washington, 14; Idaho, 5. The next bulletin announced the final score and the students fairly went wild with joy. Later in the evening the complete summary of the meet came and was bulletined. This was the only full report received in this city.

The team arrived home this afternoon in a jovial frame of mind. The summary of the meet as sent the Guard by Manager Winslow follows:

The boys are all O. K. Will be in Eugene tomorrow afternoon. The meet was a great financial success, Dan Kelly was the star athlete of the day.
