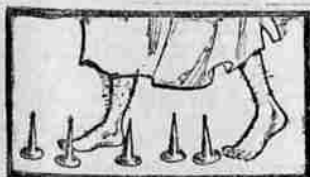

BOMB-THROWER UNDER ARREST IN MADRID

Madrid, June 1.—A high police official states that the bomb thrower during the wedding procession has been arrested and has confessed. He is now in the Madrid jail. King Alfonso was so close to death that a ribbon on his coat was torn by a splinter. Fourteen are dead as a result of the explosion and General Weyler is injured. Queen Victoria is indisposed today as a result of the bomb throwing, and the crowds are participating in the festivities half-heartedly.

Alfonso's attendants are to attend the victim's funeral.

TWO ATTEMPTS MADE.

London, June 1.—Local anarchists state that two attempts were made to assassinate King Alfonso and bride Thursday. The first bomb failed to explode in the church.

ENGLISHMAN ARRESTED.

Madrid, June 1.—An Englishman named Robert Hamilton has been arrested as an accomplice of the would-be assassin and the crowd tried to lynch him. Hamilton was identified as the man on the balcony with the bomb thrower.

RAILROADS ARE AGAIN UNDER FIRE

Washington, June 1.—Inquiry into the relations of the Pennsylvania and Baltimore & Ohio railroads with the coal industry have been resumed by the interstate commerce commission. Cassatt's assistant, Postlewait, denied owning any coal mine stock, although he had sold a large interest within the past two years. It developed today that the Frick company was specially favored in the car supply by the railroads.

STEUNENBERG TRIAL OVER FOR A YEAR

Boise, Idaho, June 1.—The defendants in the Steunenberg murder case this morning reconsidered their intention of applying to the supreme court for a writ of habeas corpus or to make an application for bail. They will take no further action for the present.

The trial is not likely to occur before next February or March.

CASTRO REFUSES TO RESUME PRESIDENCY

Washington, June 1.—The state department is advised that Gomez has asked President Castro to resume the presidency. Castro refused, but is willing to act as Gomez' secretary. Gomez will now call the legislature to accept Castro's resignation as president of Cuba.

JURY ACQUITS MUCH-ACCUSED GIRL

New York, June 1.—Josephine Terranova, aged 17, was found not guilty by the jury in twelve minutes on the charge of murdering her uncle and aunt.

General News Notes

Michael Davitt, the great Irish patriot, died yesterday. He was 60 years old and death resulted from an illness of short duration. Davitt was an author and lecturer of world-wide fame and a celebrated leader of the Irish land league.

COMMITTEE VOTES TO UNSEAT SMOOT

Votes Stands Seven to Five Against the Mormon Apostle—Believed That He Has Taken Oaths In Church Contrary to Provisions of Constitution—Bailey's Motion to Expel Burton of Kansas Is Postponed 'Till Next Week.

Washington, June 1.—The senate committee on privileges and elections by a vote of 7 to 5 declared Smoot, of Utah, not entitled to a seat in the senate. Chairman Burrows will report the committee's conclusions to the senate. Smoot is an apostle of the Mormon church, and the committee, as a result of the thorough investigation made, declared that he had taken oaths in the church that conflicted with his obligation as a senator of the United States. The polygamous practices of the Mormon church also entered largely into the controversy. The work of women's and church societies, which sent in monster petitions from every state in the Union, is believed also to have had a tendency to influence the decision of the committee. There are conflicting opinions as to whether the senate will sustain by a two-thirds vote the action of the committee.

Votes were also taken as to whether the committee should recommend that the senate exclude or expel Smoot. Exclusion was voted down and on the motion to expel the members were divided evenly.

Washington, June 1.—The senate passed the employers' liability law today as urged by organized labor.

PACKING HOUSE REPORT.

Washington, June 1.—It is officially announced that the president will send to congress the O'Neill Reynolds' report on the Chicago packing houses, probably next Monday.

SOLD IN AMERICA.

Chicago, June 1.—The disclosure was made today that the federal government permits the carcasses of diseased animals to be sold to consumers in this country. Carcasses in many cases are rejected by European governments and the annual saving to the packers amounts to millions by disposing of them in America.

HEAVY LOSSES REPORTED IN EASTERN OREGON

Pendleton, June 1.—The total estimate of the flood loss in Umatilla county and to stock in the mountains will amount to nearly \$2,000,000. The stock loss has been heavy and it is impossible to determine its extent at this time as owners cannot get into many localities. Every hour brings new reports of greater damage. Dead sheep have been seen all along the streams in the mountains, herders finding it necessary to abandon them to escape themselves.

The damage loss at Pendleton will amount to over \$50,000. The west end of the city is full of pools of water, and many homes cannot be entered for some time. In the low places water has settled near the levee, ruining gardens and homes.

DESPONDENT STATESMAN KILLS HIMSELF

Washington, June 1.—Congressman Robert Adams, of Pennsylvania, author of the whipping post bill, shot himself with suicidal intent this morning and died later. The weapon was discharged in his mouth and the bullet went through his brain.

Speaker Cannon in the house read a letter received by him and written by Congressman Adams last night, making clear his suicide intention. The letter said:

"The fact that my personal obligations exceed my resources is my only excuse for abandoning the responsible position I occupy in the house. I am willing to be buried at the expense of the house, and ask that no committee be appointed or memorial services held, as I never was in sympathy with the latter custom."
