Walla Walla and Pendleton and the adjacent country are not crying for water. More than four inches that fell over a large scope of country there in forty-eight hours has entirely satisfied them.

That Pendleton telegraphic correspondent of the Oregonian should take note that he is but partially correct when he writes of stocks of goods from plows to rice being ruined by the flood. The ordinary plow stands water about like the duck.

A circular letter headed "Oregon State Association opposed to the extension of the suffrage to women," comes to this office. It is signed by sixteen women with residences in different localities, all bearing the prefix "Mrs." but one, Miss Pickel, Eugene.

That Blue River road matter is becoming a really vital issue. The miners of the district have apparently decided that Lane county and the city of Eugene have no use for them, also some reasonable effort would be made to give them a means a public highway in this direction. They have held a meeting and decided to turn to Linn county for relief if the attitude of this county is not changed and prompt action is not taken to bring about more satisfactory conditions.

Coney Island, the main Sunday resort for New York's multitudes, is to have an amusement tower seven hundred feet high. It will cover a ground space of three hundred feet square and have ten elevators. At three hundred feet there will be a ballroom and at six hundred feet palm gardens with a scenic railroad. Other floors will be devoted to other amusement features. The Eiffel tower, the highest built structure of the world, is 981 feet high. At 836 feet it has a diameter of thirty-three feet, just half the width of one of our streets.

Is there an intelligent voter in Lane county at all posted on men and measures who does not sag at least to himself that George Chamberlain, defeating Furnish for governor of Oregon four years ago was most fortunate? If not just let him consider those twenty-seven out of twenty-nine of Chamberlain's vetoes sustained by Republican legislatures. A weaker man than Chamberlain would have drifted with the tide. He sent the bad measures back to the legislature and his good reasons for disapproval won their support. Will you vote against such a man for governor? If you had a man like that employed to attend to your private business would you discharge him that you might give the place to an untried man? You wouldn't do it.

A very singular case that at Bristol, Connecticut, where for two years not a baby has come to the colony of four hundred Italians. They figured it out to their own satisfaction that the witchcraft of Carmencita Mineto, an Italian woman who arrived in the colony just two years ago, is responsible for the unwelcome sterility. She attempted to stab her to death. It seems they did not take the several months preceding her arrival into

consideration, as important surely as the following ones in such a reckoning. It makes no difference about facts, though, when an excuse is wanted or a theory has to be borne out. The wolf ate the lamb in fable just the same though the latter showed that drinking from the stream below the wolf it could not have muddied the water that came to his wolfship.

It makes no difference to the intelligent voter whether or not Fred Fisk has been endorsed by any organization outside his own party. If this has been the case it is nothing more than a non-partisan recognition of his faithfulness and ability as an official and will be so regarded. Such an official as Lane county's present sheriff makes himself thoroughly familiar with the laws and seeks only to uphold and enforce them; only the law-breaker has any cause to fear his acts. The men who are engaged in the saloon business will not be disturbed so long as they keep within the pale of the law, neither will the prohibitionists have cause to fear the non-enforcement of the statutes so long as he is in control of the situation. Sheriff Fisk does not make the laws, and whether he approves them or not it is his duty to see that they are enforced so far as his jurisdiction extends in that direction. The only question before the voter is whether there is another candidate in the field better qualified for the position or in whom more reliance as an official may be placed. The friends of Fred Fisk are willing that he be judged by that standard, fully satisfied that the verdict is to be rendered by a majority of his fellow citizens of Lane county.
