CARE OF THE FACE.

How It May Be Improved in Texture and Complexion.

If more faces were really clean a great improvement both in texture and color of complexion would be noticed. Even the woman who does not patronize the beauty doctor can make use of up to date methods of cleansing her skin. After a day spent in grime and smoke the skin is in a condition that is beyond the reach of water, and unless one is careful as to soap and softeners it may do more harm than good. A good cleansing cream is a necessity and it should be applied after a day spent in the open air and after leaving it on a little time washed off with a soft rag. After the cleansing cream a good astringent lotion may be sprayed on, as this completes the cleansing process and freshens one more that would be believed. The comfort of a clean face quite apart from its looks is altogether delightful, and, as one patron of the beauty parlor declares, "It makes me feel rested and refreshed and in a good temper."

When the pores are filled with a black accumulation of long standing steaming is necessary, and this is also something that one can do without professional help. Rub in the cleansing cream, and after it has been on for a little while lay a towel over the face that has been dipped in water as hot as you can possibly bear, holding it first over one part of the face and then the other.

The face especially is in need of treatment of this kind after exposure to strong winds, which dry and crack the skin and put in many a wrinkle. CRYSTAL WEDDINGS.

An Appropriate Way to Celebrate These Anniversaries.

The "crystal wedding" commemorates the fifteenth anniversary. Write your invitations with a very pointed stick wet with mucilage, then sprinkle "diamond powder," which is pulverized mica, over the paper and let it stand until the mucilage is dry.
