OREGON STILL HAS PLENTY OF RAIN

Last Week Showers Fell All Over State and Weather Has Been Cool

From the weekly bulletin issued by the Oregon section of the United States weather bureau at Portland for the week ending June 4:

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The week opened and closed showery and cool, with an intervening period of from two to three days with mild temperatures and clear skies. The rains on Tuesday and Wednesday were excessive over limited localities in the northeast section of the state. The Umatilla river overflowed its banks and did considerable damage to the streets in the city of Pendleton and the bridges and fences along its course from that city to its mouth at Umatilla. In a few other localities in that section farm lands were badly washed by heavy rains, but the good done in the larger territory where the rains were only moderate, much more than compensated for the damage done in the few limited areas where they were excessive. Friday morning the temperature was dangerously near the frost mark, both in the eastern and western portions of the state, but no frosts were reported. The winds during the week were generally light and mostly from

the west, but some of the rain squalls were attended by wind rushes of short duration.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Portland, Multnomah county.—The middle of the week was sunshiny and warm, while the opening and closing days were showery and cool. No high winds occurred.

Aurora, Clackamas county.—Fair weather prevailed generally. The prevailing winds were from the north-west.

Corvallis, Benton county.—Partly cloudy weather prevailed during the first four days of the week, with light rain all. The latter part of the week was clear and warm. No frosts or high winds occurred.

Forest Grove, Washington county.—The weather during the week was cool and cloudy, except on Friday and Saturday, when it was warm and clear. There was but little rain and no high winds.

She was descending the stairs and her toe caught at the top step, and she fell headlong to the bottom of the stairs.

FISK WINS BY LARGE MAJORITY

Close Race for County Commissioner--Other Offices Are Carried by Republicans

The election as far as Lane county is concerned was a quiet affair, in which party lines were loosely drawn. The principal interest in Eugene and several other localities was manifested in regard to prohibition, and it is now certain from returns received that the county has gone "dry" by 200 or 300 majority. In Eugene the anti-prohibition won out by a small majority, but this will not be effective, since the entire county is "dry."

All the results are not yet definite, owing to the slow counting, and even in Eugene one precinct will not be completed before evening. This fact and slow returns from the country precincts make it impossible to give the result on what seems to be the only doubtful contest on the county ticket, that of commissioner. Douglas and Edwards are running neck and neck. Thirty-one out of 50 precincts give Douglas, Dem., a lead of 22 votes over his opponent.

Bingham, Rep., for state senator, has defeated Veatch, probably by 400 or 500.

Fisk, Dem., defeats Warnock, Rep., by 1500 or more.

The Republican members of the legislature are elected, with Washburne leading the ticket. Edmunson leads the Democratic candidates, with Hayes second, but both are beaten. Lee, Rep., for clerk, will have a larger majority than Fisk.

Collier, Rep., for surveyor, and Gordon, Rep., for coroner, have good majorities.

On the state ticket Chamberlain has carried Lane county probably 250 or 300. Other Republican candidates carry the county by greatly reduced majorities, Galloway and Matlock running ahead of their ticket.

In the Eugene district the Republican candidates for justice and constable win by good pluralities.

Owing to the incomplete returns it is impossible to give a tabulated statement of the vote.

Thirty-five precincts in Lane county, including all the larger ones, except Florence, give the following vote on governor: Chamberlain, 2122; Withycombe, 1912; Chamberlain's plurality, 210.

Twenty-nine precincts give Hawley, Rep., for congress, 1904; Galloway, 1573.

Thirty-four precincts give Bingham, Rep., 2213; Veatch, Dem., 1830.

VOTE OF COTTAGE GROVE.

Cottage Grove, Or., June 5.—The vote of the two Cottage Grove precincts is as follows:

Chamberlain, 279; Withycombe, 281; Matlock, 190; Steel, 377; Galloway, 228; Hawley, 300; Veatch, 336; Bingham, 202; Douglas, 252; Edwards, 217; for prohibition, 273; against, 237; for woman suffrage, 288; against, 251.

The Eugene justice district consists of the four Eugene precincts, Blanton, Baile and Zumwalt. R. S. Bryson, Republican, is elected justice over Geo. W. Kinsey, Democrat, and J. H. Bower, Independent. F. T. Plank, Republican, is elected constable over L. Bonney, Democrat.

At Springfield R. W. Smith, Republican, was elected justice without opposition. L. E. Thompson, Republican, defeated J. C. Mulligan for constable.

WILL AID SCHOOLS OF SAN FRANCISCO

Oregon Teachers Ask for Contributions to Help Reconstruct Buildings

The school teachers of Eugene Lane county have each received a circular letter from State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman relative to donations for the stricken schools of San Francisco.

It appears that 31 school buildings were destroyed and that it will cost about \$6,000,000 to replace them. Donations are to make up a reconstruction fund for the purpose of building the schools. The purpose is that whenever contributions are given a state shall reach a certain amount to construct a building named that building after the donor, giving the money. There are those who doubt when certain members of school board deserve to be slapped and it seems that this was one of the times. From the Hood River courier we learn the result of the trial and Miss Pitney scores a victory. That paper says: The case of Inez Pitney against the Pine Grove school board for salary claimed was due, also damages, was tried before Judge Nickelsen and a jury Monday and Tuesday. A verdict resulted in the plaintiff for \$214 salary, \$214 damages, and costs amounting to \$150. The case attracted a good deal of attention, it being necessary to use the opera house to accommodate the crowd and witnesses. A good deal of feeling among the school rooms present was also manifest, it is the most deplorable part of the matter.—Times.
