EVIDENCE OF OFFICIAL GRAFT IS PRODUCED

Philadelphia, June 6.—Additional evidence of graft among the Pennsylvania railroad officials was developed by the interstate commerce commission hearing today. J. H. Boyer, chief clerk of the motive power department, admitted getting money from the coal companies. Much came to him in unsigned letters and his rake-off on tonnage was received from the operators furnishing the company coal.

NO IMMUNITY BATH.

Philadelphia, June 6.—An "immunity bath" will not be furnished President Cassatt, of the Pennsylvania railroad, by the interstate commerce commission, which refuses to subpoena him before it for hearing.

CONVENTION OF FEDERATED CLUBS

St. Paul, June 6.—Mrs. J. E. Cowles, of Los Angeles, was nominated for treasurer of the Women's Federation of Clubs today, and the election occurs tonight.

Despite a promise to the contrary woman suffrage came before the convention today incidentally, and it was applauded.

A telegram from President Roosevelt was received saying that he approved the resolution of the women to save the big California trees and would call the attention of congress to the matter.

MANY CHANGES IN CORPORATION OFFICIALS

Walla Walla, June 6.—The trustees of the W. & C. R. have accepted the resignation of General Manager McCabe and M. Levy, of Tacoma, has been appointed his successor. The resignation of J. G. Cutler, as assistant treasurer, was tendered and accepted, and the vacancy filled by the appointment of M. P. Martin, of Tacoma. Cutler was made general superintendent.

LEDoux MURDER TRIAL POSTPONED

Stockton, Cal., June 6.—The venire of 36 jurors in the Ledoux murder case was exhausted and a special venire summoned today. The trial was continued till next Friday. Mrs. Ledoux is charged with murdering her husband and packing his body in a trunk.

EATING DOGS AND HORSES FOR FOOD

Washington, June 6.—Germany has during the last quarter of 1905, according to Consul Mannheim, of Germany, slaughtered 52,000 horses and 25,000 dogs for food purposes. The figures show a gain over the preceding periods.

PRESIDENT ATTENDS SOCIAL EXERCISES

Washington, June 6.—President and Mrs. Roosevelt today attended the commencement exercises at the National Cathedral school for girls in the suburbs of the city, in which their daughter Ethel is a student.

KAISER WILHELM VISITS EMPEROR

Vienna, June 6.—Kaiser Wilhelm arrived here this morning and is visiting Emperor Francis Joseph.

Russian Land Bill

St. Petersburg, June 6.—The land bill passed on the first reading in the duma today.

TWENTY-THREE HUNDRED IS STATE MAJORITY

Full or Partial Returns From Every County Makes Figures Definite--Bourne Will Beat Gearin Less Than Twenty-five Hundred--Sheriff Word Behind but Will Contest Election on Ground of Fraud

Portland, June 6.—With complete or partial returns from all the counties in the state Governor Chamberlain's plurality is 2300. The final returns will not materially change the figures. The counties which went for Chamberlain include Baker, 600; Clackamas, 400; Clatsop, 250; Lane, 250; Linn, 500; Multnomah, 250; Umatilla, 200.

Withycombe carried Benton by 300, and Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lake, Lincoln, Sherman, Tillamook, Wallowa, Wasco, Washington, and probably Harney by narrow margins.

Bourne's plurality over Gearin for United States Senator will be less than 2500.

WORD WILL CONTEST.

On the face of the returns Stevens, Republican, is elected sheriff of Multnomah county by a plurality of twenty. Tom Word will contest the election on the ground of fraud in Sellwood precinct, where two hundred votes, not registered, were sworn in to defeat local option by the brewery located there.

ELECTION RESULTS IN STATE AT LARGE

M. A. Miller has been re-elected state senator from Linn county over Geo. W. Wright, Rep., by 700 majority.

J. E. Hodges, Dem., defeated Geo. P. Brownell in Clackamas county for state senator.

W. M. Pierce, a well-known Democratic leader, has been defeated for joint senator in Umatilla, Union and Morrow counties.

In Coos county the Democrats have elected W. W. Gage sheriff and John Hall county judge. The Republicans carry the county on the state ticket.

Two Democrats won in Douglas county by large majorities, Agee for clerk by 750, and Wonnacott for judge by 500. McClallen, Rep., is re-elected sheriff by 380.

Marion county elects the entire Republican county ticket by reduced majorities. Dr. Byrd, Dem., ran ahead of his ticket, but was defeated by F. J. Miller for joint senator from Marion and Linn.

The Democrats as usual elect C. J. Trenchard judge of Clatsop county, but the rest of the ticket is probably Republican.

All the leading Democrats, Chamberlain, Gearin and Galloway, carried the Republican stronghold of Yamhill.

Republicans probably elect the county ticket in Malheur with the exception of clerk.

Benton county gave Withycombe 300 majority. The Democrats elect Burnett sheriff and Buchanan treasurer. The Republicans elect Vincent clerk and probably the rest of the ticket.

Umatilla elects Taylor, Dem., sheriff over E. J. Summerville.

Linn county elects M. A. Miller, Dem., senator; D. S. Smith sheriff, and the commissioner. The Republicans elect J. W. Miller clerk and the rest of the county ticket. The county voted "dry" on the liquor question.

The election was a warm one in Lincoln county on the ocean. The very hard fight between Sheriff Ross and Warnock resulted in the re-election of Sheriff J. H. Ross for about the fifth time by about 100 plurality. Swope beat Stewart for judge and Ira Wade was elected clerk. The county went for Withycombe by about 200. The vote on prohibition resulted in favor of a dry county. It is said the Indians on the reservation voted nearly solidly for prohibition.

Governor Chamberlain obtained a plurality of 30 in Polk. The county ticket was divided. J. M. Grant, Democrat, was elected sheriff; E. M.

Smith, Republican, clerk and Beardsley treasurer. On the question of prohibition the county went wet.

In Josephine county the Democrats will carry all county offices except representative. Stephen Jewell, Democratic nominee for judge, has a big majority over F. W. Chausse. Joseph Russell, Democrat, will also win over Ed. Lister, Republican. J. T. Taylor, Democrat, is elected treasurer. A notable feature of the local campaign is the heavy socialist vote. Chamberlain and Gearin both carry the county.

ASTORIA SALOONS WILL FIGHT LOCAL OPTION

Astoria, Or., June 6.—As a result of the election Astoria will have a large dry district. This district includes about three miles and leads from the depot to the city limits east, all of the precincts in this city having favored the local option law.

This will do away with about 10 saloons. The North Pacific Brewing company, which was established in this city years ago, lies in the path of the dry district and their fate is imminent.

The local option law in this city is fast becoming popular. It was passed in the west end one year ago and has been legally observed since its inauguration.

The conditions are quite different in the east end and some fear is expressed that the saloon men will not at once comply with the law, some of the saloons in this district having recently been built. It is said that the brewery will fight the new law, and make an effort to retain their large business.

ROSEBURG GOES WET.

Roseburg, Or., June 5.—The two precincts in this town which went "dry" two years ago, voted "wet" by a large majority yesterday.

GOVERNOR FOLK TO WELCOME BRYAN

New York, June 6.—Governor Folk, of Missouri, has been appointed chairman of the committee for the reception to be given Wm. J. Bryan when he arrives in this country.

QUAKER REPUBLICANS.

Harrisburg, June 6.—The Republican state convention for nomination of a state ticket met this morning. Without doubt Edwin Stuart will be nominated for governor. The platform shows a breaking away from boss rule practices.

CANDIDATE E. G.

BURNS DROWNED

Roseburg, Or., June 6.—E. G. Burns, independent candidate for joint representative for Coos and Curry counties, was drowned Sunday morning in Rogue river with a companion. No details are obtainable at present of the disaster.

Elliot Will Not Resign

Boston, June 6.—President Elliot, of Harvard, says he has no intention of resigning his office on account of the Harvard football situation.

Beechey, the airship operator, whom nearly every one saw at the Lewis and Clark fair in Portland last year, fell from his airship during a flight at Cleveland, Ohio, Sunday. Though the fall rendered him unconscious he was not hurt. The accident was due to collapse of the long triangular framework beneath the balloon.
