COMPANY IS WILLING TO AMEND THE FRANCHISE

In Regard to Graveling Streets on Which Tracks Will Be Laid

But Cannot Consent to Have the Hauling of Freight Restricted to Night Time Except on Willamette and Eleventh Streets

A. Welch, manager of the Willamette Valley Company, was in Eugene a few hours today looking after the work of putting in the new water system and the new gas works. He was in conference this forenoon with the company's attorney, Chas. A. Hardy, in regard to the franchise for a street railway system in Eugene for which the company has made application, and which is now under discussion by the city council.

Mr. Welch instructed Mr. Hardy to redraw the proposed ordinance to conform to the wishes of the members of the council in regard to graveling the streets on which the tracks are to be laid. The company consents to gravel the streets nine feet on each side of the track, making 18 feet of gravel, whereas at present in the residence districts the gravel portion of the streets is only 1 feet wide. In regard to that part of the proposed ordinance relating to the hauling of freight cars over the tracks in the daytime, the Guard is authorized to state that if the company is not allowed to haul freight over other streets than Willamette and Eleventh in the daytime they don't want the franchise and will give the matter no further attention. The company is perfectly willing to have the hauling of freight cars on Willamette and Eleventh streets restricted to the late hours of the night, but if the same restrictions are placed on the other streets on which it is proposed to build the street railway tracks it will be no use to proceed further with negotiations for the granting of the franchise.
The franchise will be discussed at the next meeting of the city council, which occurs on Monday evening, June 11.

RAIN IS BAD FOR HOP TRAINING

Vines Grow too Fast and are Brittle Grain Crops Looking Fine

The present continued damp weather is hindering the training of the hop vines. Reports from several parts of the county to the Guard indicate that the growth of the vines has been too rapid and when attempt is made to train them they break. There has not been enough sunshine to toughen the vines.

All other crops are reported in a flourishing condition. Grain has not looked better in years, and prospects for a bumper yield are excellent.

About the only thing that has been injured is strawberries, and they are now doing better than expected two or three weeks ago.

WILL ORRELL INJURED AT PORTLAND

Will Orrell, formerly of Eugene, now residing in Portland, was seriously injured in that city last Thursday. A team he was driving ran away with him, throwing him to the ground. One of his legs was broken and he was otherwise badly hurt.
