PACKERS KICK AGAINST LAW

Washington, June 7.—Thomas E. Wilson, the Chicago packers' representative, continued his statement before the house agriculture committee today and will be followed by Neill. He said his serious objection to the Beveridge amendment was the placing of inspection cost on the packers. He denied that the packers dug the hole they are now in, and asserted that the agitation had cut the sale of fresh manufactured products more than half. He predicted a calamity to stock raisers on account of no market.

Neill followed Wilson on the stand and denied any expert knowledge, but qualified as a man of average intelligence with college degrees. Neill said he did not expect to find parlor conditions and was careful to distinguish between necessary and unnecessary dirt. He said Dr. Dyson, representing the packers, asked him to withhold the report for thirty days so that the packers might adopt Neill's suggestions. At the expiration of thirty days Wilson wanted Neill to return and make another investigation and publish what he might see then.

THE REBATE CASES.

Kansas City, June 7.—The rebate issue against the Armour, Swift, Morris and Cudahy packing companies began today in the federal court with the selection of a jury and the submission of an agreed statement of facts.

GETS MORE PAY

AFTER JULY 1.

Washington, June 7.—Postmasters of the following Oregon cities were today allowed an increase of \$100 annually, commencing July first: Ashland, Astoria, Coquille, Elgin, Eugene, Heppner, Huntington and Klamath Falls.

An increase of \$200 annually is given the postmaster at Hood River. (The increase noted in the dispatch brings Postmaster Page's salary up to \$2500 a year. It is based on postal receipts of practically \$17,000 for the year ending March 31, 1906, indicating a very satisfactory growth of the city.)

RAILROAD EMPLOYES

ADMIT THEIR CRAFT

Joseph Aikens Gives Testimony Corroborating That of Joseph Boyer--Both Men Were Employed by Pennsylvania Railroad But Received Money and Stock from Coal Companies--Got Rich on Small Salaries.

Philadelphia, June 7.—Joseph K. Aikens, for twenty-seven years chief clerk of the Monongahela division of the Pennsylvania railroad, testified today at the interstate commerce commission hearing to owning thirteen hundred shares of coal mining stock, which cost him \$50,000. He also received a small amount of additional stock as a gift. He admitted sending Boyer \$16,000 which the latter admitted in his testimony yesterday. The money was sent as a commission he said. It was a business matter and Boyer looked out for Aikens.

Aikens' wages ranged from \$30 to \$125 monthly during the thirty years he was employed and he bought coal stocks through his investing his wages.

Once he was given \$300 by an operator. He also received \$50 monthly for an "indeterminate interest" in the coal company's store.

BOYER'S TESTIMONY.

Philadelphia, June 7.—That he accepted gifts of stock amounting to \$11,000 and money aggregating more than \$46,000 from the coal mining

companies during a period of about three years, was admitted today by Joseph Boyer, chief clerk in the office of A. W. Gibbs, superintendent of motive power in the Pennsylvania railroad, at today's hearing of the interstate commerce commission. Boyer purchased the fuel coal used in the locomotives, and the donors of the gifts were the coal companies which furnished the fuel of the railroad. Boyer named five companies which allowed him five cents on each ton sold to the railroad company.

BOYER GETS THE AXE.

Philadelphia, June 7.—President Cassatt has demanded the immediate dismissal of Joseph P. Boyer, who yesterday confessed to receiving a secret commission on the company's coal purchases.

LAI TO REST AT OAK HILL

Washington, June 7.—The late Senator A. P. Gorman was buried with simplest of rites in Oak Hill cemetery today. Rev. Wallace Radcliffe, Presbyterian, was in charge of the brief ceremonies at the house and a joint committee of the senate and house attended in a body. There was no music and flowers were received from relatives only. Chaplain Hale, of the senate, assisted in the services.

General News Notes

The Kansas City Journal says that \$10,000,000 damage has been done to the packing interests of the country by the publication of the Neill-Reynolds report. Frank J. Hagenbarth, president of the National Livestock Association, prints a letter in the Salt Lake Herald scoring the president for his course in this matter.

The Democrats of Arkansas, in state convention at Hot Springs, endorsed Wm. J. Bryan for president, and nominated Jefferson Davis for U. S. senator and J. S. Little for governor. South Dakota Democrats nominated J. A. Stransky, of Brule, for governor and S. A. Ramsey and W. J. Elder for congress. Bryan was endorsed for president.

The court of appeals at Albany, N. Y., yesterday affirmed the cost and judgment of \$2236 in favor of Anna T. Fago, of Wyoming county, against the supreme tent of the Knights of the Maccabees of the world, a fraternal organization. The case is of interest in view of the fact that that plaintiff's husband, who held a policy in the organization, committed suicide, and despite the fact that the by laws state that no benefits shall be paid to the beneficiaries of a member who commits suicide, the lower courts awarded the plaintiff a verdict and the highest court in the state has affirmed the judgment.

Many prostrations from heat and three deaths occurred from heat in Chicago yesterday. The temperature was 90 degrees.

CLOUD BURST

OCCURS NEAR JOHNSTOWN

Pittsburg, June 7.—The weather bureau office has received a telegram from Johnstown stating that a cloudburst along the Conemaugh river caused the stream to rise thirteen feet between 8 and 9 o'clock this morning.

The cloudburst occurred at Hooversville on Stony Creek, eighteen miles above Johnstown. Many houses were damaged and a pleasure resort was wiped out. So far as known there were no human fatalities, but the people fled to the hills. A woman watching the flood from a bridge was struck by a train and killed and an infant thrown from her arms was drowned. Wild animals in a park zoo were carried down the river on the debris and railroad tracks were washed out.

PETITION TO IMPROVE

SIUSLAW ROAD

George M. Miller Tells the County Court of Proposed Automobile Line

George M. Miller today presented to the county court a numerous signed petition asking for an appropriation of enough money to keep at least one road between Eugene and the Siuslaw country in first-class condition the year round.

Mr. Miller in presenting the petition explained to the court that it was planned some time in the future to put on a line of automobiles between Eugene and Hale, giving the people of the western end of the country rapid transit. This could not be done, however, unless a greater portion of the road is plankled. As the court cannot see its way clear to expend the money for such improvement at present, the plans will probably not be consummated for several years to come.

The official count of Multnomah county gives R. L. Stevens four majority over Tom Word for sheriff, and the former has taken the oath of office. Word will contest on the ground of fraud.
