INSURANCE CONCERN FAILS TO PAY LOSSES

San Francisco, June 8.—The local agent of the Eagle Insurance Co., issued a statement today to the effect that he had been notified by the New York office that his company had cancelled all existing policies in San Francisco. The company's liabilities in San Francisco were \$673,244, capital \$300,000, surplus \$376,072.

This is the first concern to repudiate its risks as a result of the recent disaster since the Traders' company failed. It is feared that other companies will follow its example.

SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS ON DOLLAR

San Francisco, June 8.—President Nichols, of the National Insurance Company, of Hartford, has arrived to take charge of the company's affairs.

He announces that his company, together with the Colonial Underwriters, an affiliated concern, will pay about 75 cents on the dollar.

HANGED NEGRO TO PREVENT LYNCHING

Norfolk, Va., June 8.—Gabriel Battal, a Negro, aged 18, convicted of criminal assault, was hanged while the militia was on guard to prevent his being lynched by a mob.

AGED MAN HANGED

Walla Walla, June 8.—A. A. Armstrong, an aged man, was hanged in the penitentiary this morning while protesting his innocence, for the murder of Robert Patton in Wynoochee Valley a year ago for cutting wood on his premises.

TWO MINERS KILLED IN STRIKE RIOT

Indiana, Pa., June 8.—Two strikers were killed and six others wounded at Ernest, a mining town, early today when the miners clashed with the state constabulary. An unknown miner fired on a squad of constabulary, which opened fire in return.

NARROW ESCAPE OF STATE CAPITOL

Baton Rouge, La., June 8.—The state capitol building was saved from destruction this morning when Governor Blanchard and a member of the legislature, in their night clothes, fought the flames. Defective wiring was the cause and the damage amounted to \$8000.

PROMINENT WOMAN UNDER SUSPICION

Madrid, June 8.—A prominent republican leader's wife has been arrested as an accomplice of Morales, the would-be assassin of King Alfonso. She confessed to buying the workman's clothes in which Morales escaped from the city.

DOUMA DEBATES DEATH PENALTY

St. Petersburg, June 8.—The debate on abolishing the death penalty threatened to get beyond bounds in the douma today and the sitting was almost broken up by the labor party opposing postponing consideration and violently attacking the ministerial party.

CHICAGO PACKERS FORCED TO ADVERTISE

Will Spend a Million Dollars Trying to Convince Public That They Are Not as Bad as Represented--Reynolds Testifies Before Home Agricultural Committee Today--More Reports Submitted.

Chicago, June 8.—It is estimated that the packers will be forced to spend \$1,000,000 stemming the indignation aroused by the recent expose. "Advertising contracts" are being made with newspapers and already \$50,000 has been spent here in full page advertising, asking the public to visit the plants. This morning advertisements appeared in many Eastern papers.

Local publications which attacked the packers are not given any of the advertisements.

REYNOLDS TESTIFIES

Washington, June 8.—Jas. B. Reynolds testified before the house agricultural committee today stating that the matter in the Neill-Reynolds report was observed by him. Chairman Wadsworth denied the published reports that he (Wadsworth) was friendly to the packers in asking questions yesterday. He said he wanted only to find out the truth. Reynolds said the inspection for the

foreign trade was satisfactory, but there was always a disagreeable odor about the Chicago packing houses which the New York houses did not have.

MORE REPORTS SENT IN

Washington, June 8.—President Roosevelt today sent to the house agricultural committee two reports of the inspection of Chicago packing houses by the agricultural department before the Neill-Reynolds investigation. The president in his letter to the committee comments on the immediate extraordinary improvement in packing house conditions following the Neill-Reynolds report.

THE REBATE CASES

Kansas City, June 8.—The government holds that the shipper is equally culpable with the carriers in the case of the packers on trial on the charge of accepting rebates from the Burlington railroad on export shipments. A verdict is expected tonight.

SENATE AND HOUSE WILL NOT AGREE

Washington, June 8.—The senate's disagreement to the rate bill conference report was reported to the house today. No action was taken or motion made for further conferences.

WILLIAMS MAY RETIRE

Washington, June 8.—John Sharp Williams may retire at the end of the congressional session to accept a University of Virginia professorship. Williams will not discuss the report but says he has received no offer.

FREE ALCOHOL NOW

Washington, June 8.—The president has signed the bill taking the tariff off denatured alcohol.

GAME WARDEN BAKER OFF FOR KENTUCKY

State Game Warden J. W. Baker left Wednesday noon enroute to Kentucky, where he will visit until the latter part of his month, attending in the meantime a reunion of Kentucky wardens. If Chamberlain had been defeated it would have been claimed no doubt that John had left the state in disgust. DEMOCRAT IS ELECTED TO LOWER HOUSE

Potlaid, June 8.—Full returns show the election of a lone Democrat, Hermann Rothschild, of Union county, to the lower house of the legislature, which will have fifty-nine Republicans. The senate will be composed of six Democrats and twenty-four Republicans. Rothschild defeats G. W. Cole, Republican.

WILL MOVE WOOD PRESERVING PLANT

The wood preserving plant of the Southern Pacific, which has been located at Lathain, Or., is making preparations to leave for Dietz, Cal. This portable plant consists of two retorts, six feet in diameter and 115 feet long, with the necessary tanks and equipment on cars. The cross tie capacity for one retort is 30,580 feet, and with two retorts an average monthly output of 4,250,000 feet is attained. The ties are placed in the retorts filled with a chloride of zinc solution, and subjected to a steam bath of three hours, 280 degrees of heat and 50 pounds pressure. The process employed being known as the Burnettizing process. The plant is equipped for treating lumber with a creosote process. It is claimed the results attained have shown the efficacy of the treatment by the increase in the life of the treated timber over the ordinary lumber. —Timberman.

FINED FOR VIOLATING THE GAME LAW

E. D. Tibbets, connected with the power plant at the Lucky Boy mine, Blue River district, was fined \$25 a few days ago for violating the game law in regard to killing deer out of season.

MRS. B. C. MILLER DIED SUDDENLY
