Governors of Oregon

Since Oregon was admitted to the union on February 14, 1859, she has had 11 governors, six of whom have been Democrats. No Republican governor of the state has ever been elected for a second term and two Republicans have never been governor in succession. There has always been a Democrat sandwiched in between the Republicans. The only governors of the state to be re-elected are Grover, Democrat, who served from 1870 to 1877, being succeeded by Chadwick, a Democrat, when Grover was elected to the United States senate; Pennoyer, a Democrat, who served from 1897 to 1899, and George E. Chamberlain, who was elected to his second term last Monday.

The re-election of George E. Chamberlain as governor of Oregon makes the third instance in the history of the state of the re-election of a Democratic governor. The eleven governors were as follows:

1. John Whiteaker, farmer and Democrat, of Lane county, served from March 3, 1859, to September 10, 1862.

2. Addison C. Gibbs, lawyer and Republican, from Portland, served from September 10, 1862, to September 12, 1866.

3. George L. Woods, lawyer and Republican, from Wasco county, served from September 12, 1866, to September 14, 1870.

4. L. P. Grover, lawyer and Democrat, from Marion county, served from September 19, 1870, to February 1, 1877; being re-elected he filled out part of his second term, when he was chosen United States senator, and was succeeded as governor by Stephen F. Chadwick, who became the fifth governor.

5. Stephen F. Chadwick, lawyer and Democrat, from Douglas county, who served as governor from February 1, 1877, to September 11, 1878.

6. Walter W. Thayer, lawyer and Democrat, from Portland, who served from September 11, 1878, to September 13, 1882.

7. Zenas F. Moody, merchant and Republican, from Wasco county, who served from September 13, 1882, to January 12, 1887.

8. Sylvester Pennoyer, lawyer and lumberman, Democrat, who served two terms from January 12, 1887, to January 14, 1895.

9. William Paine Lord, lawyer and Republican, from Portland, who served from January 15, 1895, to January, 1899.

10. Theodore T. Geer, farmer and Republican, of Marion county, took office January 15, 1899, and served until January, 1903.

11. George E. Chamberlain, lawyer and Democrat, from Multnomah county, was formerly attorney general of Oregon and district attorney of Multnomah county. He was elected on June 4, 1902, and took office in January, 1903. Re-elected June 4, 1906, for second four-year term.

His fate while still in the prime of life, apart from the potent consideration of the satisfaction that comes to the man who leads a correct life, should be convincing to youth and manhood that honesty is the best policy. This from the Portland Journal is better warning than all the sermons that could be preached. Pater is no longer the bon vivant—

the dashing cavalier whose meteoric career in Portland was for a time the envy of all rounders. There are deep lines in his face, dark wrinkles beneath his eyes, and there is a rapidly increasing quantity of gray in his hair. Care has laid a heavy hand upon him and its imprint is deep.

Most of the sheriffs-elect are Democrats. How does that happen with the state so heavily Republican? For the same reason that it has happened right here in Lane—the Democrats, appreciating the handicap under which they run put up their very best men, while relying on their majority, the Republicans are not so particular; besides, a contest for the nomination usually leaves sore spots that do not heal by election day.

The Merchants' Protective Association has voiced the wishes of a majority of the people of Eugene in unanimously declaring in favor of the granting of the electric railway franchise. Now let the city fathers rise to the occasion next Monday night and act in harmony with the spirit of progress that is being awakened in the city. Let the street cars come!

Ament the contest at Portland over the sheriff there are some inexplicable figures from the eighth precinct. The total vote for governor in that precinct was 189 and for senator 187. For sheriff it was 336, and while it gave Chamberlain ten majority on half the number of votes, it gave Stevens, the Republican candidate for sheriff, 66 majority.

Wm. J. Bryan seems to be the biggest man in the Democratic party yet and the Republicans will have to groom some one besides Fairbanks for the race if they expect to defeat him next year.

Postmaster Page is very willing that the work in his office should increase. It has just given him a hundred dollar raise in salary, commencing July 1—\$2400 to \$2500.

The Salem Journal calls Bourne the people's choice. Yes, but how much did it cost him to secure this highly gratifying mark of public confidence?

S. A. D. Pater feels very sad, so the Portland papers say. Probably he has heard the news of Governor Chamberlain's re-election.

Encourage the city directory men. A work of that kind is badly needed here.
