THE WEATHER HAS BEEN TOO COOL

Weekly Report on Weather Conditions for State of Oregon

From the official report of the Oregon section of the United States weather bureau for the week ending Monday, June 11:

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The weather during the week was unseasonably cool, due in a great measure to the excessive cloudiness that prevailed. As the week progressed temperatures rose gradually, until at the close they were above the normal throughout the greater portion of the section. Frequent showers occurred on almost every day, but they were generally light except along the coast, and in Umatilla county, where the heavy rains that fell during the fore part of the week resulted in badly swollen streams that, in many localities, overflowed their banks, causing considerable damage. The waters were, however, rapidly subsiding toward the close of the week. Low temperatures occurred throughout the Columbia river valley on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and in extreme Southern Oregon on Thursday, but no frosts were observed. The winds were generally light, and during the forepart of the week were from the south and southwest, shifting later to west and northwest.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Portland, Multnomah county.—Cloudy skies prevailed during the entire week, with frequent light showers. Abnormally cool weather prevailed until near the end, when the temperature moderated considerably.

Forest Grove, Washington county.—The week was cool and cloudy, with considerable rain during the forepart.

Corvallis, Benton county.—The weather was showery all week, except Thursday.
