COUNCIL VISITED BY THE CITY'S BUSINESS MEN

Urged to Act Immediately Upon the Railway Franchise Matter

Ringier Speech Made by D. E. Yoran, President of Merchants' Association—Another Meeting June 19

When the city council was called to order by Mayor Wilkins last night the room was filled with representative business men who had gathered to urge the necessity of immediate action on the proposed ordinance granting a franchise for an electric street railway in the city.

Before beginning with the business of the evening Mayor Wilkins extended an invitation to any one present to address the council. Professor John Straub was the first to speak. He stated that very few of the citizens knew much about the provisions of the proposed franchise and suggested that it be published in the papers.

D. E. Yoran, president of the Merchants' Protective Association, who has been foremost in creating an interest in the electric railway matter, as well as in all matters pertaining to the city's growth and welfare, made the speech of the evening. He urged immediate action on the part of the council and suggested that better things could be done for the city if the council would get down to a harmonious working basis.

R. A. Booth favored a competing railroad but wouldn't like to see a street railway built now. He said the city is not yet large enough for it, and that the building of the tracks would mar the appearance of our beautiful streets.

W. K. Scarborough and M. Svarrud spoke in favor of the street railway.

Councilman W. W. Calkins took occasion to state some objections to the proposed franchise and intimated that he didn't believe that the Willamette Valley Co. intended using the franchise themselves if they secured it.

As stated in last evening's Guard, it was not the intention of the council to act on the franchise last night and such was announced by Mayor Wilkins. After the business of the council was completed an adjournment was taken till Tuesday evening, June 19, at which time the franchise will be further discussed.

BUSINESS MATTERS.

A petition for an are light at Fifteenth and Willamette streets was read and referred.

The contract for street sprinkling was laid over for explanations.

A petition for grading and graveling Garden street, in Fairmount, was read and granted.

The matter of paying the freight on the old fire apparatus to be exchanged for a new chemical engine was discussed and it was agreed to pay half the amount.

The matter of collecting the city's share of the county road money collected was discussed. City Attorney Bean reported that he had put in the claim to the county court, which promised to look into the matter. The attorney was instructed to institute suit against the county in the circuit court if the claim is not allowed.

"Resolved, That J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R., extend a vote of thanks to all our citizens for their assistance and sympathy upon that occasion.

"Resolved, That we desire to especially thank Mayor Wilkins and Chief Farrington and other city officials for keeping the circus off Willamette

street during the hours the G. A. R. was using it for their parade: "Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be furnished to the press of Eugene."

The gift of the books was accepted with thanks.
