He first went to the Holy Land, where he spent several weeks among the ruins, and then proceeded to Rome, where he was given a personal audience with Pope Pius X. Speaking of his audience with the pope, Rev. Black said:
"When I was ushered into the presence of the holy father he was sitting at an ordinary table, with a lot of papers which he was examining. We dropped to our knees, of course. My companion introduced me, when the pope arose and motioned me to a seat. He was standing and the thought entered my head that I could not sit down while the head of Christendom was standing, so I waited till he was seated. Then followed a most cordial chat. He was most amiable and the picture of health in body and mind."
"On leaving, I asked him for a blessing for myself and congregation. To my surprise and gratification, the pope took two of his recent photographs and wrote the apostolic blessing for myself underneath one, and then did the same for St. Francis church. This was a special favor and rarely ever granted. I attribute the favor I received at the hands of the pope to his friendship for our Archbishop Christie."
A musical program in honor of Father Black's return is being arranged by Father Goodrich, and Father Dominic is preparing an ode of welcome to the returned priest.

SURVEYORS OUT FOR THE WILSEY LINE

Eight Crews for the Oregon Coast & Eastern Have Begun Work
A Number of Eugene Men in the Company's Employ and All Bills Are Regularly Paid
The Oregon Coast & Eastern railroad, the Wilsey enterprise, is still being heard from and those who claim to know say that the project is not hot air, as contended by many, and that time will prove that the promoters mean business and have meant business from the start.
One thing is certain, and that is the promoters have paid all their bills for the past two years with cash and at present have nearly a hundred men in their employ. Among them are a dozen or more well-known Eugene men who have been working in the Portland office of the company and on the right of way along the coast.
The Guard was informed yesterday that eight crews of surveyors have just been started out on the proposed line. One crew will work toward the coast from Portland, another south from Tillamook, one each way from Yaquina Bay, one each way from Coos Bay, and one each way from Eureka, Cal.
Nothing has been heard lately about the extension from Siuslaw to Eugene, but it is probable that after the main line down the coast is located work of surveying for the laterals will begin.

COMMITTEES WILL MEET WITH THE COUNCIL

In an Endeavor to Reach an Agreement on Electric Railway Franchise
Four Representatives Each from the Commercial Club and Protective Association to Hold Conference With Council
At the regular meeting of the Commercial Club last night the matter of the city council's granting a street railway franchise was discussed, and acting upon the suggestion of some of the members of the council, the club authorized President Whitson to appoint a committee of four to meet with the council and a like committee from the Merchants Protective Association to go over the proposed franchise together in an endeavor to come to an understanding as to just what kind of a franchise is wanted so that immediate action may be taken by the council. President Whitson has not yet appointed his committee, but will do so within a short time.
The plan is for the two committees to meet with the council as a committee of the whole before the adjourned meeting next Tuesday night and go over the franchise carefully section by section. In this way an agreement as to the provisions of the franchise can then be reached. The ordinance can then be redrawn and it ought to be passed at Tuesday night's meeting.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC CO. WILL BUILD FLUME

To Convey Lumber from One of Its Proposed Mohawk Sawmills the Railroad
The Southern Pacific Co. is preparing to build a long flume from its second sawmill to be erected in the Mohawk to the Wendling branch railroad for the purpose of carrying the lumber from the mill to the cars. To the first mill, which is now being erected near the Arnel place, a spur will be constructed but the site of the second mill is near a good stream of water, which can easily be utilized for fluming purposes. A deed conveying the right-of-way for the flume to the company from R. A. Neil, of Yakima county, Wash., through whose land it will extend, was filed for record with the county clerk yesterday afternoon. The land in question lies in section 17, tp 16, south of range one west.
