Rebuilding a City

The Southern Pacific Company is issuing regularly a bulletin of events connected with the rebuilding of San Francisco. This is not only a commendable enterprise on the part of the railroad company, but it will also materially assist in the great work of rehabilitation by focusing public attention upon the operations in progress, enlist public interest and co-operation and attract capital.

What it means, in money, to make a start towards the reconstruction of San Francisco, takes on definite expression in the shape of estimates for the first new structures—thirty in number, which will be under way as soon as men and material can be assembled for the work: \$14,102,000; over fourteen million dollars! And the total floor space exceeds 50 acres. Combined in one vast structure the plans would equal a building the size of the famous Palace Hotel 200 stories high, or twice the height of the Eiffel Tower. This is only the beginning, and refers only to high-class structures. Up to date about 500 applications for building permits have been filed, figures which will be largely increased as soon as adjustment of insurance is made, says the Bulletin.

Contracting agents report that all building plans are invariably superior in class, finish and equipment, to buildings destroyed by fire.

A feature of many of the new buildings is to be the installation of an absolutely fireproof vault in the basement, which will be arranged to accommodate each tenant with a separate compartment, similar to safe deposit vaults. A prominent construction company, under commission of Eastern capital to erect a number of A-class office buildings on leased ground, is responsible for the statement that desirable sites are commanding higher rental than before the fire. This confirms the promised stability of values in the business portion of the city.

The wholesale district of Greater San Francisco will be concentrated in a new and advantageous location. The region lying south of Channel street, on the property of the Southern Pacific Company and convenient to their extensive terminal yards, has been selected by a special committee, as most accessible for the economical handling of traffic. Fifty-five leading concerns are arranging quarters in this zone, and every facility is being provided to speedily restore normal trade conditions.

An impregnable safeguard against serious financial depression under any condition is the great wealth which California has in her mines. It is just now a valuable asset—appreciable by many a business man who is able to fall back, for a time, upon his income from investments in mines. This remains unaffected; mining being no longer a speculative venture, but a matter of skill and science—an established industry.

Crises of a character as tremendous as the San Francisco fire affect confidence—the foundation upon which every business transaction is built. In all civilized countries the bulwark of confidence is gold, and California's gold supply—minted and in her vaults, and stored in rich and inexhaustible ore bodies underground, is the greatest in the world.

An Eastern View

Collier's Weekly expresses what might be termed the Eastern view of the recent Oregon election, and seems surprised that the state should have gone Republican, after the general in-

dignation and, in some cases, conviction of so many office holders and leaders of that party. It finds, therefore, in the result more of a personal endorsement of President Roosevelt than of the party with which he is affiliated.

Regarding the re-election of Governor Chamberlain, Collier's has this interesting comment:

"Governor Chamberlain, who has now been elected for the second time running in the face of enormous republican majorities on the general ticket, takes his place with Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, and Garvin, of Rhode Island, in the list of Democrats who are so much stronger than their party that they can carry their states when the party has no chance. If Oregon were nearer the national center of political gravity this would be likely to make him a formidable presidential candidate. Even as it is it may put him into the running for second place. He appears to be a natural politician, with an extraordinary talent for making friends. Whether his capacity in this line could be spread out to advantage beyond the local field is, of course, a question. Neither of the great parties has ever taken a candidate for either place on its national ticket from any state west of Nebraska since the civil war. But Fremont, the first presidential candidate of the Republican party, hailed from California, and he did not seem to lose any votes in the East in consequence. Nor did Blaine, of Maine, suffer in the West. Some day a man nominated entirely on his own merits, without any geographical calculations, may give the politicians a surprise."

There is room today in Oregon for 10,000 more men to work at common labor, at wages higher than have ever before been paid for common labor in time of peace in the United States. The Pacific coast is calling to the East for its surplus working population. Here in Oregon the working-man may find the most beautiful conditions, the best living, the pleasantest surroundings, the warmest welcome and a climate that will permit him to work out of doors the whole year.
