UNITED BRETHREN CONFERENCE IS IN SESSION

Convened This Morning at
Nine O'Clock in Mason
Memorial Church

Bishop Wm. M. Bell of Berkeley,
Cal., Presiding--Appointment
of Pastors to Be Announced on Sunday

The 53d session of the Oregon annual conference of the United Brethren in Christ convened in Mason Memorial church in this city at nine o'clock this morning. Bishop Wm. M. Bell, D. D., of Berkeley, Cal., who will preside at all the meetings of the conference, opened this morning's meeting.

The auditorium of the modest little church edifice on East Eleventh street was well filled with delegates and members of the local congregation when today's sessions were opened. All the meetings promise to be largely attended as great interest is taken in the conference. Eighty or more delegates are expected to be present.

Bishop Bell, who is one of the most eloquent speakers in the denomination's ministry, addressed the conference this morning and his address will be the feature of each morning session during the conference. The evening services will be of especial interest as interesting programs have been arranged. The annual appointment of pastors

will probably be read by the bishop at Sunday morning's service.

After the address by the bishop the following committees were appointed: On conference relations—Rev. Geo. E. McDonald, of Eugene; Rev. H. C. Shaffer, of Portland; and Rev. P. H. Neff, of Salem.

On devotionals—Presiding Elder Rhodes, of Philomath; Rev. Geo. E. McDonald, of Eugene, and W. O. Ziegler, of Eugene.

On nominations for Philomath College trustees—Rev. F. W. Jones, of Philomath; Rev. P. H. Neff, of Salem, and Miss Teresa McDonald, of Philomath.

A good part of the morning and afternoon sessions was taken up with the hearing of reports from the pastors of the conference. The reports were all excellent and indicated a healthy growth of the churches during the year.

Tonight Professor P. O. Bonebrake, of Philomath, formerly pastor of the church here, will preach. The public is cordially invited to attend these services, as well as all the sessions of the conference.

IMMENSE POWER TO BE GENERATED ON M'KENZIE

Emery C. Dye Locates Sites
for Five Different Canals on
Lane County Stream

He Is Said to Represent the Willamette Valley Co., Although
Local Manager Denies it--80,
000 Horse Power

Emery C. Dye, a young electrical engineer of Oregon City, and W. T. Campbell, of this city, returned to Eugene last evening from a trip up the McKenzie, having gone as far up as McKenzie Bridge, 45 miles from this city. During the trip Mr. Dye filed on a chain of water power sites on the river, five in number, extending down the river from a point a short distance below McKenzie Bridge to a point near "Dutch Henry's" old place, about 25 miles from here. The papers were filed with the county clerk this morning.

Dye is said to represent the Willamette Valley Co. in this work, although no information concerning the matter could be obtained from the company's office in this city.

Manager Welch seemed reticent about discussing the matter and denied any knowledge of Dye's connection with the company. However, a close friend of Dye's in this city has stated that he is in the employ of the company. Mr. Campbell, with whom he made the trip up the river, was not told who Dye was working for, but is under the impression that it is the United Railways Co., which has just begun the work of building an electric railway from Portland to Hillsboro and which has announced its intention of building on up the valley. Inquiry at Oregon City, Dye's home, brought out the admission that he was employed by one of the two companies, but no definite information could be secured.

Whoever Young Dye's employers are, they are securing some very valuable power sites. Mr. Campbell, who is well acquainted with the river almost from its source to its mouth, says that 80,000 horsepower can be generated at the sites located. Four of the proposed canals are capable of developing 15,000 horsepower each, and the fifth, the one farthest down the river, will develop 20,000 horsepower. At the last mentioned site it is planned to construct a dam 100 feet high clear across the river, creating an immense lake.

If young Dye is working in the interests of the Willamette Valley Co. this move is right in line with a previous announcement of the company that it intends to build an electric railway up the McKenzie river to the Blue River mines. These proposed ditches can furnish all the power and much more, too, necessary from the operation of the line. Then again, it may be the intention of the company to manufacture power along the McKenzie for the operation of cars on its proposed line from Eugene down the valley.

DESCRIPTION OF THE SITES.
The description of the ditches or canals is as follows:
McKenzie River Power Ditch No. 4.—Point of diversion on the south side of the river about two miles below Friselli's place at McKenzie Bridge in section 16, township 16, south of range 3 east. This is near the mouth of Horse creek. The ditch will be about two miles long. The amount of water appropriated is 2200 cubic feet.

Ditch No. 5.—Point of diversion on north side of the river near Shell Rock grade in section 5, township 17, south of range 3 east. This is about 35 miles from Eugene. A submerged dam will be built and the ditch will extend down the south side of the river for three and a half miles. The amount of water appropriated here is 200 cubic feet.

Ditch No. 6.—Thirty-seven hundred cubic feet of water. Point of diversion on south side of river in section 34, township 16, south of range 3 east, at Gate creek. The ditch will be three and a quarter miles long. This is the same location made first by the city of Eugene when a municipal electric light plant was contemplated. This is 33 miles from Eugene.

Ditch No. 7.—Twenty-eight hundred cubic feet of water. Point of diversion on the south side of the river opposite the mouth of Gate Creek. This is in section 28, township 16, south of range 2 east. The ditch will be two miles long. This is 30 miles from Eugene.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC CO. WILL BUILD FLUME

The Southern Pacific Co. is preparing to build a long flume from its second sawmill to be erected in the Mohawk to the Wendling branch railroad for the purpose of carrying the lumber from the mill to the cars. To the first mill, which is now being erected near the Arnel place, a spur will be constructed but the site of the second mill is near a good stream of water, which can easily be utilized for fluming purposes. A deed conveying the right-of-way for the flume to the company from R. A. Neil, of Yakima county, Wash., through whose land it will extend, was filed for record with the county clerk yesterday afternoon. The land in question lies in section 17, tp 16, south of range one west.
