Last Monday John Larrison, a 19-year-old young man, left Springfield owing the Goodman lodging house \$18 of a board and lodging bill. The proprietor swore out a warrant in Justice Wintermeyer's court and Constable Rowland arrested the delinquent at Al Lane's Rowland station, last night at midnight. He pleaded guilty today and was given an 18-day sentence in the county jail, a day for each dollar.

General News Notes

United States Senator Allison, of Iowa, is in very poor health and his friends are alarmed. He is 77 years old.
Senator Channery M. Depaw, of New York, is being trained by Muldoon, the champion wrestler, at White Plains. The senator is said to be rapidly improving in health as a result of the exercise he takes.
Sarah Bernhardt is reported to have cleared \$250,000 on her recent tour of America. The receipts of her performances during her stay in this country were \$1,085,000.
Construction was begun Thursday on the long discussed Front street electric railroad, says the Portland Journal. It will be three and a half miles long, a double track, and will cost approximately \$300,000. The road will be built by the Los Angeles Construction Company, of which M. H. French is president, and the work will be done under the direction of W. D. Larrabee and J. E. Taylor, executive engineers of the United Railways company, and the city engineer.
The lower house of congress has voted, 161 to 36, for a lock type Panama canal. The provision was made part of the sundry civil appropriation bill, which appropriated \$25,000,000 for a continuation of work on the canal.
