"Bel Raggio Lushingre,"

from "Semiramide," given by Miss Grace Mount, served as a climax to the program. Miss Mount's clear soprano voice had broad field for displaying all its charming qualities and it easily did so. Her past year work has been very marked and her future work will be watched with great interest. Frank Friesell sang in his usual pleasing way and won hearty applause from his many friends who always delight to hear him. Bert Prescott is a new tenor to Eugene audiences, this being his second appearance in recital. His voice is of a pure quality and is exceedingly well managed. His solo, "Without Thee," (D'Hardelot), brought out the true beauty of his voice. He is easily deserving of a high place in music circles. The work of Miss Florence DeBar, as piano soloist for the evening, cannot be too highly spoken of. Her number, the G minor Concerto by Mendelssohn, was played in a most refined and mature manner. The pleasing allegro movement was only surpassed by the clear toned andante, followed by the sparkling vivace movement. Her style, aided by her musical temperament, made the Concerto one of the best piano numbers heard in any recital this season. Mr. Frazer, her instructor, was at the second piano. He was also the accompanist for the entire evening, a position that he is only too able to fill as it should be. This recital ends the student recitals for the school year and Miss Stinson is to be highly congratulated on the successful students she presented and for her excellent work in the voice department.

A large number of the members of the Baptist church surprised Rev. and Mrs. O. C. Wright at their home last evening with a well planned social. The evening was pleasantly spent, the solos and encore of Miss Esther Devereaux, Mr. Wright, and duets by the Misses Young.
