Frank Armitage was appointed court bailiff and Earl Prior jury bailiff. J. M. Howe is acting as bailiff to the district attorney as usual.

No grand jury was chosen and it is probable that none will be, as no very important criminal cases are to come up this session.

Probably the best baseball game seen in Eugene this season was played Sunday afternoon between the Springfield team and McCormick's Colts, of this city. Springfield won, 1 to 0. All the credit for the victory is due Charley Tallafiero, Springfield's crack twirler. He struck out nine men, and three different times when Eugene had a man on third base with only one down, he arose to the occasion and each time struck out the next two men at bat. The game throughout was a clean one, only one error being made and that by Lemley, Springfield's catcher. Eugene played a splendid game, but was unable to connect with Tallafiero's benders, securing only two hits. Clifford, Eugene's fair-haired little twirler, had plenty of speed and good control and held the opposing batters down to five scattered hits. Eugene was materially strengthened by Teabo and Saunders, of Chemawa, as catcher and first baseman respectively.

At the end of the game Tallafiero was carried off the field on the shoulders of a number of Springfield enthusiasts, including Banker Henry Stewart. The big twirler is deservedly popular over at Springfield. He has the material in him for the making of a league pitcher, and by proper coaching he might be able to make good in the minor leagues.
