REUNION IS BEING LARGELY ATTENDED

Registration of Veterans Greater Than at Any Previous Meeting.

Big Parade on the Streets this Forenoon. Dinner at Noon and a Program at the Opera House Tonight.

The present reunion of the Lane County Veterans' Association is the most successful in point of attendance held since its organization eight years ago. Up till two o'clock this afternoon the registration was as follows: Veterans of the Civil war, 150; Spanish-American war, 21; Indian wars, 5; members of the W. R. C. and L. of G. A. R., 120.

Last night's campfire at the G. A. R. hall was well attended and all present enjoyed the program.

BIG PARADE
At 10:30 o'clock this morning the annual parade was formed. One hundred and five veterans were in line, over twice as many as in last year's parade, and probably more than at any previous reunion. The column marched through the principal business streets of the city with drums beating and colors flying. The old boys in blue were received with cheers and hurrahs as they proceeded on the route mapped out for them.

Returning to the G. A. R. hall the veterans enjoyed a season of music, both instrumental and vocal, till the noon hour, when an elaborate dinner, prepared by the W. R. C. and L. of G. A. R., was served in the banquet room.

E. U. Carter, of Ashland, has been elected president of the State Bankers' Association.

The lower house of congress, by a vote of 139 to 82, Saturday afternoon, adopted the senate resolution providing for the purchase of material and equipment of the Panama canal of domestic manufacturers unless the president shall in any case deem tenders or bids therefor exorbitant. The sundry civil bill also was passed. It carries a total appropriation of \$94,578,040, nearly \$20,000,000 of which is for the continuation of work on the canal. Among the features of the bill is an amendment discontinuing canyons at all state and government homes of the old soldiers where government appropriations are available.

PETITION TO ACQUIRE LUCKY BOY ROAD

Gate Creek Road Will Form Part of a Belt Line--Petition to Be Sent Up at Once

The petition for opening the Lucky Boy road as a county road has been prepared and will at once be sent to Blue River for signatures. It is necessary to secure the signatures of at least twelve freeholders. The matter will come up before the county court at the August term.

As will be noted in the petition, the plan is to join the Lucky Boy road with the Gate Creek road, making a belt line. Teams going in by one route can go out the other if they prefer. The description of the road is as follows:
"Commencing at the northeast end of Main street in Watt's addition to

Blue River City in section 21, township 16, south of range 4 east, thence running in a northwesterly direction, following what is known as the Lucky Boy road, as near as may be to get a good road, to the Lucky Boy mining property; thence northwesterly on the most practical route to the top of the ridge near the Badger mine; thence northerly and easterly to or near the top of the ridge, on the most practical route, to the Gr at Northern mining property and there ending. Also commencing at the top of the ridge near the Badger mine, where the above proposed road turns easterly on the most practical route to Durango Flat and to connect with county road No. 435, known as the Gate Creek road. The intention of this petition is to locate a county road on the most practical route giving access to all the principal mining properties in the Blue River mining district, Lane county, Oregon."

John Mulkey, the seventeen-year-old son of B. F. Mulkey, president of the Ashland Normal School, died in Ashland Thursday, June 14. The young man had been suffering from tuberculosis for several months, and last fall his father took him to Southern California, in an attempt to benefit his failing health. The funeral was held Saturday at Pleasant Hill, his old home.
