YOUNG DYE

ASKS FOR

FRANCHISE

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held last night, presided over by H. B. Henderson, president of the council, in the absence of Mayor Wilkins. Emory D. Dye, the young man who recently filed on several water power sites on the McKenzie river, presented an application for an electric railway franchise in the city.

Mr. Dye claims to represent independent capitalists who propose to build a trolley line from Portland to Eugene, via the west side country. He offers to give a bond of \$2000 as an evidence of good faith, will pay one and a half per cent. of the gross earnings in the city; construction to begin within six months and completion of the line within 18 months.

It is known who young Dye represents, but as stated in the Guard of the day, it may be the United Railways Co. It is not thought now that he has anything to do with the Willamette Valley Co.

BUTTE PHENOMENON

APPEARS AGAIN

Smoke or Vapor Appears from the Top of the Fir Trees.—No Solution to the Mystery.

At different times for several years past Eugene people have observed a strange phenomenon on Skinner's Butte. About dusk they have noticed what appears to be smoke emitting from the tops of the fir trees and shooting upward. This was noticed again last evening by a number of people and excited a good deal of curiosity. An investigation of the phenomenon has been made, but no solution has ever been offered.

Lowell Items

Lowell, June 10.—Baxter Young, of Fall Creek, drove a large band of cattle to the range on the reserve this week, also George Neet, and Hyland brothers and Mr. Stewart, of Cottage Grove.

Grant Hyland raised through Lowell the thirteenth of this month bound for Klamath Falls with four hundred head of cattle.

Wm. Kobay, who is employed by the railroad surveyors, is wanting eight men and three horses to aid in the surveying between the mouth of the North Fork and the summit of the Cascade range.

The Hill Bros' drive of logs for the Booth-Kelly Company is now passing Rushisland.

The late wind and heavy showers are causing the heavy grain to fall. Early grain is in the boot and is easy lodged and will no doubt be hard to save for either hay or grain.

The logging camps along the river above Lowell have all closed down for the present and most of the men have gone on the drives. The Charley Williams drive is two miles below the Lowell ferry. The logging donkey is being moved from the Grant Hyland place over to Winberry, following the Winberry trail from Rushisland. Jasper Hills is superintending the work.

There has been quite a number of teams passing through here, bound for Eastern Oregon, some bound for Klamath Falls to locate on lands in the irrigation districts and some to take homes on government lands open for settlement.

The Rushisland school, five miles up the river above Lowell, will close the 22d with a program of exercises. Miss Grace Saylor is the teacher.

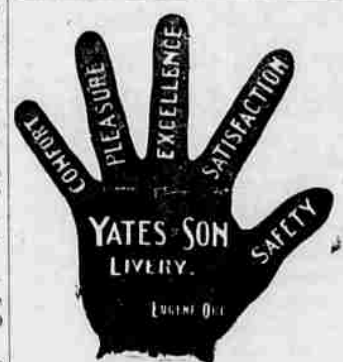
