## KILLED BY FALLING ROCK IN MUSICK MINE

Frederick Phillips Crushed to Death at 11 O'Clock Monday Night

Was Only Nineteen Years Old and His Home Was at Kerbyville, Josephine County--Survivor of Silver Lake Holocaust

Frederick Phillips, aged 19 years, was instantly killed at the Musick mine in the Bohemia district Monday night at 11 o'clock by a mass of rock falling upon him. The young man was working in an upraise in the mine and was trying to dislodge a 1000-pound rock. Suddenly and without warning the rock broke loose and bore the young man to the ground, crushing his life out instantly. The body was taken to Cottage Grove, arriving there last evening, and will be buried in the Masonic cemetery near that city. Young Phillips' home is at Kerbyville, Josephine county, where his father, C. E. Phillips resides. He was born at Klamath Falls. His mother and two sisters were burned to death in the Silver Lake holocaust about twelve years ago. Frederick escaped by hanging onto a man's coat-tail, being pulled down the stairway of the hall in that manner. He leaves one brother and two sisters who are now at Cottage Grove. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, being unable to work on a locomotive recently on account of having recently received a gunshot wound in one foot. He had been in the Bohemia district only ten days, having worked at the Champion mine three days previous to going to the Musick. He was on his second shift at the latter when his death occurred.

## WHAT SISTERS MAY DO.

## KITCHEN APRONS.

They Should Be Made Pretty as Well as Serviceable.

When making kitchen aprons be sure to bring the gathers well round to the back, so that the back or sides of the dress will be protected. Have the belt long enough to tie, for if it is short the needed pin is generally missing, and a button soon comes off in the laundry. Make aprons long as well as wide, and the advice to add a ruffle to the lower edge is good, for a ruffle will catch most of the dirt and save the dress beneath. It is a good idea to ornament some of the work aprons a little, for someone when one has a starched gingham apron with a little cross stitch vine worked across it she is twice as careful of it as when an old faded print apron is worn. So many of the soft, fine wide cottons are now made that the stock of aprons need never be low. Make them at home, for the flimsy cloth and coarse machine stitching of the ready made aprons are no credit to the wearer. One cannot wear the handsome white aprons such as cooking teachers wear while there are pots and kettles to wash, but more of the daintiness of the lecture room could with profit be adopted in most kitchens—Chicago Inter Ocean.
