ANARCHISTS AFTER HAAKON AT TRONDHJEM

Several Arrests Made and Bombs Seized by Police. Wm. J. Bryan Arrives on the Scene and Refuses as Usual to Discuss Politics at Home.

Trondhjem, June 21.—King Haakon received the American embassy this morning with due courtesy. The preparations for the coronation are progressing favorably, but an anarchist sensation has been sprung. Several anarchists known to the European police have been arrested quietly to prevent the possibility of an attack on the king. A number of bombs have been seized. Wm. J. Bryan arrived this morning and said he could not discuss American politics. He had been away so long, but he is certain the Democrats will adopt a progressive policy.

DRYDOCK DEWEY NEARING MANILA

Singapore, June 21.—The dock Dewey arrived here this morning. (The drydock Dewey, with capacity to lift the biggest warship afloat, was built at the Brooklyn navy yard and some two months ago in tow of two big colliers purchased by the government during the Spanish war, started on her long journey of some 12,000 miles, about half way around the globe, for Manila. Singapore is about 1500 miles southeast of Manila in China Sea waters.—Ed.)

RUSSIAN SOLDIERS ENGAGE IN MUTINY

St. Petersburg, June 21.—It is reported that during a mutiny at Sebastopol the soldiers captured two guns, but the outbreak was quelled by loyal regiments. The soldiers attacked the officers with clubs, killing one and wounding two others.

WILL BUILD CANAL IN EIGHT YEARS ON LOCK SYSTEM

Victory Over Sea-Level Advocates was Easy.—House Sends Immunity Bill to Conference.—Only One Railroad Official Responded to Invitation to Appear Before Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington.

Washington, June 21.—On the first vote on the Panama canal question this afternoon in the senate the lock type won. The vote came on a motion by Kittredge to table the Hopkins amendment providing for a lock canal, in accordance with the recommendation of the minority of the consulting engineers. The senate refused by a vote of 35 to 31 to table the amendment. It was immediately agreed to change the title of the original bill, which provides for a sea level canal, and passed the bill as amended in favor of a lock canal without division. As the lock type has already been adopted by the house and approved by the president, this action of the senate settles the question. The canal will probably be completed within eight years. The house sent the immunity bill to conference.

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY REGENTS IN SESSION

Portland, June 21.—The regents of the Pacific University are in session as the result of a quarrel which resulted in the resignation of Professor Coghill. The quarrel arose over the raising of funds for rebuilding the college.

Willamette Valley Traction Co. Has Just Purchased 60,000 Ties in at 70012. Five Hundred Tons of Steel Rails Arrive at Salem.

MURDER OF ROOSEVELT WAS PLANNED

Portland, June 21.—In the municipal court today Walter Sealaszkiewicz, a Pole, testified that the assassination of President Roosevelt was plotted here last month, and funds raised to send John Przywar, a local Russian Nihilist, to Washington as the assassin.

BRITISH SCHOONER LOST WITH CREW

Dover, Eng., June 21.—The Danish schooner Bertha sank near South Goodwin Lightship in a collision with a Dutch tank steamer. Eight of the schooner's crew were drowned, the captain's son being the only survivor.

GAUTEMALA REBELS FLEE FOR SAFETY

City of Pekin Takes Cargo of Disgruntled Politicians to Salina Cruz—Still Talk of Invading Southern Part of Mexico

San Francisco, June 21.—The Pacific Mail liner City of Pekin arrived this morning from the southern coast. The Pekin took twenty-six political exiles from Guatemala to Salina Cruz, as since the opening of the revolution about Ocus the situation was too warm for several prominent politicians. There is still talk on the part of the revolutionists of invading the southern part of Mexico, and at Chamberico attacks are expected nightly.

WALTER FOLEY NOT GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Jury Returned Verdict of Not Guilty Few Minutes After Going Out—Jury Disagreed in Case of Stockton vs. Royal Arcanum

The trial of Walter Foley, the young man who killed Cull Kelzur on a train between Cottage Grove and the Bohemia mines several months ago, the charge being manslaughter, took up most of the time in the circuit court today.

A jury was completed this morning and consisted of the following: Horace Fisk, Dexter Sparks, Chas. E. Cox, E. B. Rutan, Clark Stevens, Loren Edwards, B. Hyland, D. B. Proctor, Jesse Sovern, A. H. Hinerson, Clayton Pope, John Strome.

Medley and Johnson, of Cottage Grove, were attorneys for Foley and J. M. Williams, deputy prosecuting attorney, represented the state. Quite a number of witnesses were examined, the evidence tending to indicate that the shooting was accidental. It will be remembered that Foley, while intoxicated, was showing Kelzur a new pistol which he had purchased. In some manner it was discharged, the bullet entering Kelzur's abdomen, resulting in his death several hours afterward.

VERDICT IN FOUR MINUTES. The jury went out about 2:30 o'clock this afternoon and within 4 minutes returned a verdict of not guilty.

LARCENY TRIAL. The case of the State vs. Ed Baker, charged with larceny from the person, is being tried this afternoon. This is a case wherein W. F. Wilson accuses Baker of taking \$50 from his while he (Wilson) was asleep in a Springfield a week or two ago. The following jury was chosen in the case: H. B. Yancey, M. B. Stone, E. L. Gam, H. H. Ruth, J. J. Duckworth, J. E. Roach, A. J. Pickard, J. W. Gowdy, T. B. Davidson, F. D. Wheeler, H. B. McKinney, W. C. Renwick.

L. Bilyeu and C. M. Kissinger are Baker's attorneys, while Deputy District Attorney J. M. Williams is conducting the prosecution.
