S. P. MAY BUILD LINE WEST OF EUGENE

Report of a Plan for Extension of West Side Branch From Corvallis To Drain.

Those in the confidence of the railroad magnates say that the next mileage of railroad to be built is a cutoff starting at Corvallis and extending south to Leona, a station on the present S. P. Company's line, a few miles this side of Drain. The route closely follows the old wagon road running from the Willamette to the Umpqua.

MAY MOVE PRESERVING PLANT TO SPRINGFIELD

It is bruited, because of the litigation commenced by land owners at Latham, that the Southern Pacific Company will move its seed preserving plant from that station to a point on the company's line beyond Springfield in this county. It is claimed that the chemicals used in preserving the wood flow over the land and render it unfit for agricultural purposes hence the injunction suits. The plant heretofore has been operated six months for the year at Latham, and the remainder of the twelve months at a station in the north part of California. The plant gives employment to seventy-five or a hundred men and while in Oregon all money spent by both company and employees comes to Cottage Grove. CITY COUNCIL DISPOSES OF LEFT OVER BUSINESS

Considerable business left over from the last regular meeting of the city council was transacted at an adjourned meeting last night.

The fire and water committee reported that hydrants had been placed at East Eighth and Oak, at East Ninth and Alder and at East Thirtieth and Alder streets during May.

The bids of W. T. Campbell for \$25.85, Yates & Son, \$3.50, and Collier & Waggoner, \$15.50, all in connection with the proposed municipal water works, were ordered paid.

Surveys were ordered for grading and graveling High street from East Third to East First. An ordinance to license trading stamps, checks or tickets was introduced. The proposed ordinance provides a license of \$50 per quarter, payable in advance. The penalty for violation of the ordinance is a fine of \$25 to \$200.

Ordinance for improvement of West Twelfth street from Olive to Lawrence was passed.
Application of L. N. Roney to cut down a warehouse in the rear of his brick building on West Eighth street from two stories to one story was referred.

MRS. FALKENBURG DIED AT DENVER

Word was received here last evening that Mrs. F. A. Falkenburg, wife of the late head consul of the Woodmen of the World, died at Denver yesterday of heart trouble. She was visiting at the home of her cousin, H. F. Hollenbeck, in Eugene recently, and was quite ill while here.

FOLEY'S ACQUITTAL WAS JUST VERDICT

Walter Foley, tried for manslaughter for killing Cull Kozur, on the train between Cottage Grove and the Bohemia mines several months ago, and who was acquitted by a jury yesterday, left last night to return to the mines. He is naturally pleased with the outcome of the trial, but denies the published report that he was intoxicated when the unfortunate affair occurred. Mr. Foley says that the killing was the result purely of an accident, as the evidence at the trial showed, and this was the view of the case taken by the jury, who returned their verdict of not guilty within four minutes after leaving the court room.
