Norway's Crowning Place

Trondheim, where the coronation of Norway's king and queen took place Saturday, is a city of 25,000 people. The houses are principally of wood, substantial and spacious, and the streets wide and clean. The cathedral where the ceremony took place dates from about 1000, though principally built in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries.

The city attained its greatest importance during the last half of the latter century, by which time it had become an important pilgrimage centre and has as many as fifteen churches. With the coming of the Reformation about 1520 it soon ceased to be a resort of pilgrims and gradually declined in importance even though gaining in population.

The American people pay about \$300,000,000 a year to fire insurance companies. This tribute ought to be ample. But because of the San Francisco calamity the people are to be subjected to a levy of at least \$500,000 more a year. The insurance trust is thus becoming the greediest of all. The public safety lies in supporting and encouraging local enterprise. That ensures reasonable rates and keeps the money at home. The \$300,000,000 tribute goes mostly to New York, Connecticut and Europe. "Made in Eugene" should be the cry with assurance policies as well as other things.

The Guard is the popular daily paper of its field, just as the bright, up-to-date evening publication always is. It gives the general news from the wires and covers the local news field the day it happens. "Today's news today" is an idea that has brought the evening paper to the front in the past few years and given them the largest circulation in every progressive city of the country. The advertiser reaches the home where he uses the columns of the evening paper because it is printed and circulated at a time when the majority of people have the leisure to read it thoroughly.

"Plate sin with gold and the strom lance of justice hurtless breaks." Swift & Co., Cudahy & Co., Armour Packing Co., multimillionaire packers of Chicago, and the Chien o, Burlington & Quincy Railway, with 8500 miles of road and net earnings last year of \$21,872,714 wilfully violated the interstate law prohibiting rebates and were fined \$15,000 each. As well if you or I should violate a law fine us two "bits" each. Such a fine would hurt us as much as their fine punished them.

Not so long ago wisecracks were going to have Charles Sweeney, the Spokane mining millionaire, build all kinds of a theatre on a land purchase he had made in Portland. Now he says yes—that is, yes if some one will guarantee him rent, interest on the investment. That means no theatre will be built by Mr. Sweeney.

The congressmen are anxious to go home and look after their fences, but Roosevelt won't let them. He holds the big stick over their heads and demands action on the railroad rate bill, meat inspection legislation and other matters affecting the public weal. Good boy, Teddy!

The Oregonian and a few other state papers seem just a little dazed because the people of Oregon had the temerity to vote as they pleased at the late election.

There is a peculiar coincidence in the length of the days this month, as computed in the 1906 World Almanac. According to the almanac there are ten days of this month of equal length; that is, there are ten longer days in the year, each enjoying 11 hours and 17 minutes of sunlight. These days are June 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27, and, when June 22 is usually given as the longest day of the year, it is one minute shorter than any of the five preceding or five following days this year.

Professor Chamberlain, of the Northwestern University at Chicago, has figured out that the earth is likely to endure 100,000,000 years longer. This intelligence upon the authority of so distinguished a scientist is especially reassuring to the people of Eugene; it gives promise of sufficient time for the members of the city council to make up their minds regarding the pending street railway franchises.

Great capital at the disposal of a single individual confers on its possessor great power over the course of industrial development, over his fellow men and sometimes over the course of GREAT PUBLIC EVENTS, like peace or war between nations. It enables a man to do good or harm, to give joy or pain, and places him in a position to be feared or looked up to. There is pleasure in the satisfaction of directing such a power, and the greater the character the greater may be the satisfaction. In giving this direction the great capitalist may find an enjoyable and STRENUOUS OCCUPATION.

FOR A CONSCIENTIOUS, DUTIFUL MAN A GREAT SENSE OF RESPONSIBILITY ACCOMPANIES THIS POWER. IT MAY BECOME SO POWERFUL AS TO WIPE OUT THE ENJOYMENT ITSELF.

There are no more successful business enterprises than are those conducted by remarkably intelligent AUTOCRATS, and probably the same would be true of governments if any mode has been invented of discovering and putting into place DESIRABLE autocrats. The prevailing modes of selection, such as heredity and transmission, have been so very unsuccessful that autocracy as a mode of government has fallen into disrepute. In business enterprises the existing modes of discovery and selection of autocrats seem to be better than in the government, for autocracy in business has been JUSTIFIED BY RESULTS.

The most serious disadvantage under which the very rich have labored is the bringing up of children. It is well nigh impossible for a very rich man to develop his children from habits of indifference and laziness. These children are so situated that they have NO OPPORTUNITY of doing productive labor and do nothing for themselves, parents, brothers or sisters, no one acquiring the habit of work.
