THOMAS BELL, AGED SOLDIER, EXPIRES

Died at the Home of Henry Mathews at Goshen Sunday Morning.—Was Born in Ireland in 1818.

Thomas Bell, aged 87 years, 3 months and 17 days, died at the home of Henry Mathews at Goshen Sunday morning, June 24, 1906, at 6 o'clock, of old age. The deceased was born in the county of Down, near Belfast, Ireland, March 7, 1818. He came to America in 1844. During the civil war he served in the 16th United States Infantry and later enlisted in the 42nd Illinois Volunteer Infantry. For the past two years he had been staying at the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, but for many years had been staying at the Hawley and Mathews residences in Lane county. He had never married. The funeral was held this afternoon with interment in the Eugene I. O. O. F. cemetery.

BACCALAUREATE SERMON AT U. O. WELL ATTENDED

Rev. Frank Matthews, 1895, Gave a Sound Talk to a Big Audience and Senior Class

The thirtieth annual commencement exercises of the University of Oregon were ushered in yesterday morning as usual with the baccalaureate sermon. The day was an ideal one and the audience in Villard Hall was one of the largest ever assembled to hear the opening exercises. The large class of seniors entered with the processional march, attired in caps and gowns, and took their places at the front of the hall.

The sermon by Rev. Frank Matthews, a graduate of the University with the class of 1895, was an excellent piece of oratory and was full of plain statements and sound judgment to the senior class. His subject was "The Ministry of Vision."

One of the principal parts of the exercises was the musical numbers. Every number rendered was perfect and the good training of Professor I. M. Glen was evident throughout. The solo, "Fear Not Ye, O Israel," by J. W. Belcher, of Portland, was especially appreciated.
