Dr. Timothy Cloran

Dr. Timothy Cloran, who has just been elected to the chair of Romantic languages in the University of Oregon has an excellent record as a scholar and instructor, and comes to us highly recommended. He received his education partly in this country and partly in Europe. His A. B. degree he obtained at Adelbert College of Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio in 1891; where he was honor man at his graduation. He taught for some years at Geneva Normal School, Geneva, Ohio and at Shurtleff College, Upper Alton, Ill. In 1897 he went abroad and studied at the universities of Berlin and Strasbourg, at which latter institution he received his Ph. D. degree in 1899. Upon his return to America he was appointed professor at the University of Idaho (1899-1900), from which position he was called to Vanderbilt University, where he remained four years. The last few years Dr. Cloran spent again abroad, partly in Paris, Madrid and Italy, doing research work in his chosen line, the result of which he is about to publish. Dr. and Mrs. Cloran will arrive in Eugene some time in September.
