The naval engineers who are interested in finding some substitute for coal on board ship have little or no expectation of satisfactory results from the use of oil. Arrangements have been made for fitting out the Wyoming with an apparatus for burning oil instead of coal, and experiments will be conducted by a board soon to be designated by Secretary Bonaparte in an effort to ascertain whether oil is a trustworthy and economical fuel for ships of war. It has been used to some extent on the smaller boats, especially in the torpedo craft, which ply in home waters where there is access to supplies of oil, but it is feared that there would be embarrassment for the larger ships which cruise afar and which visit foreign ports where they would not be likely to obtain oil so easily as they now purchase coal. The principal objection to its use on shipboard, however, comes from the naval general board in a report which points out the difficulty and danger in carrying oil, and the fact that its storage tanks where the coal bunkers now are would remove one of the means of protecting the vitals of the ship from attack.

Congressman Binger Hermann is not looking forward to the adjournment of congress with any degree of pleasure. He will then be out of a lucrative government position, practically the first time in many years, besides he will not be protected as before, by being a member of the house, from prosecution on the indictments charging him with destroying public records, while commissioner of the general land office. With all this will he be suave and smiling as formerly?

Russian credit, which stood high in Europe, has been depreciated, the government bonds being about 80. These were formerly 93 and upwards, inasmuch as Russia always managed to pay her way. Russia should rely on commerce and industry for development. Half at least of the regular army should be put to manual labor.

MAJORITY DID NOT PASS AMENDMENT

Salem, Or., June 27.—It is a question yet to be determined whether the "constitutional amendment providing a method of amending the constitution and applying the referendum to all laws affecting constitutional amendments" and the "constitutional amendment for the initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws" have been legally adopted.

The former amendment received 47,961 votes for to 18,751 against, and the latter 47,678 for to 16,735 against.

It is claimed by some constitutional lawyers that a constitutional amendment must receive a majority of all the electors voting at an election to be adopted. If that is correct both these amendments lack by more than 2000 votes the required number to be adopted.

Section 1 of article 4 of the constitution, as amended by the initiative and referendum amendment adopted June 2, 1902, it is claimed, does not repeal or modify section 1 of article 17 of the constitution, which says that a majority vote of the electors of the state is necessary to adopt an amendment to the constitution.
