Front Street, June 28.—The principal features of the Portland wholesale markets today are:

Regular hams 1/2c advanced. Bacon prices 1/2c lower. Picnic hams 1/2c advanced. Hop sales at lower price. Scarcity of poultry holds price. Eggs are firm and unchanged. Car cantaloupes arrives in. Strawberries higher with scarcity. Loganberry demand is heavier. Flour buyers and sellers apart. Grain bags firm. Silks—skin onions are coming. Old potatoes sold at low price. Hay market in good shape; poor quality. Scarcity of dressed meats.

HOP SALE AT LOWER PRICE.

With the great improvement in hop crop prospects there is not now so great a demand for 1905 as a week or so ago. There are still a few orders in the market—there always are—but the prices are too low to consider. John V. Swan, of Portland, who has a hop ranch along the Chehalis-Marion county lines, sold 14 bales of choice hops of 1905 growth Tuesday afternoon at 10 1/2c per pound. The sale was made on an order from the East. Swan has been offering his hops for sale for some time, and a week or so gave an option on them to a local dealer at a slightly advanced figure. The present inactivity of the market is causing the few remaining holders to become afflicted with cold feet. Several other sales are reported around the same figure.
