MRS. MARY CHEZEM GRANTED A DIVORCE

Thursday's Oregonian: The complaint of Mary E. Chezem against Andrew L. Chezem was filed late Tuesday afternoon and service of summons had upon the defendant before 6 o'clock the same evening. The defendant, acting as his own legal counsel, filed a demurrer to the complaint early yesterday afternoon and the case came up on its merits before Judge Sears, a short time afterwards, who heard the evidence and arguments, and just four minutes from the time the case was called, rendered a decree granting the plaintiff a divorce. Plaintiff alleged cruelty and inhuman treatment as her cause of complaint, and asked for alimony in the sum of \$75 a month. The two shock hands in parting, but when the rejected spouse attempted to give her a last embrace and seal the breaking of the contract with a kiss she entered a vigorous protest and their ways parted.

The brick work of the new bank building is going up very rapidly and the contractors expect to hurry their work from now on if the weather does not interfere.

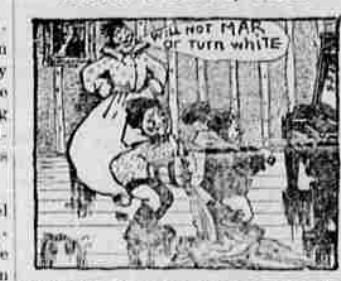
