

NEW TRAIN FOR SPRINGFIELD BRANCH

Rumor of a Daily Passenger Be- tween Woodburn and Wendling —Foundation for Oil Tank At Springfield Finished

The News was informed this week that a daily passenger train will be put on soon, running from Woodburn to Wendling.

J. K. Page, the gentleman who recently purchased the Oregon House, is having lumber hauled for the erection of a large addition to his building. He informed the News that he would soon have a force of men at work moving the hotel back and will build an addition 30x40 feet, three stories high, where the front of the building now stands.

The concrete foundation for the 30,000-gallon S. P. oil tank is now finished and the mechanics will start building the tank at once, as the steel has arrived and everything is ready for operation. The gravel and cement is being unloaded near the spot where the large 300,000 gallon tank will be built. Excavation has been started for the large tank and in a few days will be ready for the concrete.—News.

SLADDEN ORCHARD FIRE SETTLEMENT
