FOURTH OF JULY FUN.

Burlesque Circus a Feature in a Wisconsin City.

Every year for a long time the Fourth of July has been celebrated by Janesville (Wis.) citizens in a unique manner. In place of the old time games, with speeches and fireworks in the evening, a burlesque circus is given, known as the Circus of the Nonesuch Bros. Everything is a "fake" on a regular circus parade, and clowns, gophers, society ladies, business men, laborers and mechanics unite for the one day in making the circus a success. A fund known as the Nonesuch Bros' circus fund is raised and turned over to a committee to expend. Bands from all over the state are hired, and the press committee bills the circus as is done with the genuine article.

George McKee, a rich lumberman, is the leading spirit in the creation and directs the arrangements. Lawyers, brokers, business men and all dress in fantastic costumes for the day's enjoyment. So popular have become these affairs that all the railroads run special trains into the city to accommodate the crowds that come to see them.—New York Tribune.

The Stars and Stripes.

When the stars and stripes went down at Charleston in 1861 they went up immediately in every town and city in the loyal states. Four years later they went up again on Fort Sumter. Major Anderson lowered the flag in 1861. Major General Anderson raised the identical flag again four years later. WISCONSIN MEN RELEASED FROM CUSTODY

Oshkosh, Wis., July 2.—United States Court Commissioner D. E. McDonald has discharged Leander Chouteau, Ben Dougherty, James Dougherty, James M. Bray and Thomas Day, all of Oshkosh, who were indicted for alleged land frauds in Oregon. His ruling closed an examination, the first chapter of which was had three weeks ago.

HISTORY OF THE CASE

Leander Chouteau, James Matt Bray, Benjamin Dougherty, James Dougherty and Thomas Day, prominent lumbermen and bankers of Oshkosh, Wis., were indicted by the Federal grand jury of Oregon on April 3, 1906, for a violation of section 540, of the United States Revised Statutes in having conspired to defraud the Government of about 165,000 acres of public domain in Klamath and Lake Counties, this state. Sumner J. Parker, of Ashland, Or., was also indicted with this group of defendants and accused of being a go-between with the Oshkosh people and fraudulent timber locators.

The five first named, reputed to be worth an aggregate wealth far in excess of \$1,000,000, were arrested at Oshkosh Wis., May 3, and brought before United States Commissioner D. E. McDonald for hearing. Their cases have been pending before him ever since, with the result announced in the dispatch following.

District Attorney Bristol stated last night that he had received information to the effect that the three Shawano, Wis., defendants recently discharged by Commissioner McDonald, would be re-arrested tomorrow. It is probable that new proceedings will also be taken at once against the five men released at Oshkosh yesterday.
