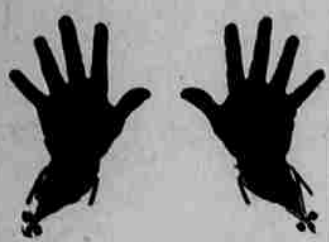

PEOPLE OF LANE COUNTY CELEBRATED

Appropriate Exercises Were
Held at Different Places
Yesterday.

Springfield, Junction City and Cottage Grove Got Share of Eugene's Population—Celebrations at Thurston, Elmira, Wendling and Other Points

We all celebrated. Some of us went to Springfield, some to Junction, some to Cottage Grove, but most of those who left town drove to some cool spot beside the gently flowing waters of the McKenzie or Willamette and spent the day in ease and comfort, the safe and sane way of observing the nation's birthday.

The celebrations at the several towns in the county were largely attended, notably those at Springfield, Junction and Cottage Grove.

AT SPRINGFIELD.

A large crowd had gathered at Springfield by the time the exercises began at 10 o'clock. The usual program was carried out. Hon. S. D. Allen, of Eugene, delivered the oration. Mrs. Dickinson read the declaration of independence, and Rev. J. M. Orrick offered the invocation. The Brownville band played inspiring airs during the day.

Probably 3000 people were in attendance at the celebration.

The sports of the day included the following:

Footrace, 100 yards, Paul Driver first and W. Smoek second. Time, 10 1/2 seconds. Prize, \$5.
Log rolling contest, John Shultz, of Fall Creek, first; Isaac Skeels, of Springfield, second. Prize, gold medal.

In the pillow fight Henry Matthews defeated George Price and Nat Roberts defeated Geo. Laman and Doc Anders. Prize, \$1.50.

In the baseball game, which was largely attended, Springfield won from McCormick's Colts, of Eugene, by the score of 5 to 3.

AT JUNCTION CITY.

The usual big crowd attended the celebration at Junction. A splendid parade was pulled off in the forenoon, ending at the park, where Hon. E. H. Belknap delivered the address of the occasion. Professor E. E. Orton read the declaration of independence, and Rev. N. J. Harbit offered the invocation. There was a program of literary and musical numbers. The Junction band furnished the music.

In the afternoon the sports, as follows, were pulled off:

Men's footrace, won by M. E. Cory. Prize, \$2.50.

Boys' footrace, won by Curtis Newland, of Eugene; Warren Hunter, second. Prizes, \$2 and 1.

Girls' footrace, won by Lulu Bailey; Reta Donovan and Oregona Farrar tied for second. Prizes, \$2 and \$1.

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CELEBRATION NOTES. Next year Eugene will celebrate and all of our neighbors who held

celebrations yesterday will attend.

Cottage Grove got the bulk of Eugene's celebrationists. Three hundred tickets for that city were sold at the local depot. One hundred and fifty were sold for points north, mostly Junction.

The plumbers of Eugene held a picnic over on the McKenzie. The crowd consisted of Louis Aya and family, Geo. Heitzman and family, Chas. and Tom Shumway and families, W. M. Long and family, Percy Long and sister and J. K. Hulbert and family.

A bell from a Roman candle struck Pat Burke in the left eye as he was standing on Willamette street last night. The injury, while very painful, is not thought to be very serious.

Eugene was quiet during the day, but the cigar stores and ice cream parlors did a good business.

David Hannagan, of Eugene, won the first prize for climbing the greased pole at Thurston and one of the prizes in the pillow fight. His brother, Harvey, also won a prize in the pillow fight.

A fist fight between two men ensued during the celebration at Junction. One of the special deputy marshals and another man went outside the city limits and had it out between themselves. Those who saw the mix-up say it was a bloody affair.
