PROBING WHITE MURDER CASE TO THE BOTTOM

Private Secretary of Dead Man Will Give Testimony Regarding Habits of Late Employer - Evelyn Thaw's Mother Tells What She Knows

New York, July 6.—Charles Hartnett, private secretary to the late Stanford White, will be examined by Assistant District Attorney Garvan in connection with the habits of White in an effort to disprove the statements of Thaw's friends, made in the endeavor to justify his murder. P. L. Berghoff, White's bodyguard, says that four detective agencies are employed by Thaw's interest to watch every one connected with White's side of the case, including all attaches of the district attorney's office.

John Burns, night chauffeur for White, declares that at least twice since her marriage Evelyn Nesbit rode in White's automobile, once alone and once with another woman. He told of the greetings between the two at other times, and said Evelyn called White "Stannie." Garvan says that if Evelyn made any affidavit before her marriage it was destroyed, because there is no trace of it now.

WHAT HER MOTHER SAYS.

Pittsburg, July 6.—Mrs. Holman, mother of Evelyn Nesbit, denies that she ever introduced her daughter to White or to any theatrical person. She always accompanied her, she says, because the girl was determined to go and she would not permit her to go alone.

TANNER PARDONED FOR TREACHERY TO HIS PARTNER

Portland, July 6.—Judge A. H. Tanner, law partner of the late Senator Mitchell, today received a pardon from President Roosevelt. He had pleaded guilty to perjury before the grand jury, and his testimony convicted Mitchell.

Tanner was very severely criticized for the course he took in regard to his business partner and lifelong friend, and his pardon now, apparently a reward from the federal government for his testimony, will serve to intensify the hatred of Mitchell's old associates and political followers.

PERSIANS DEFEAT TURKISH TROOPS

Constantinople, July 6.—Upon the disputed boundary of Persia and Turkey a battle occurred recently, the Turks being driven by the Persians from the frontier posts, which the sultan's cavalry had seized. There were heavy losses on both sides.

KING ALFONSO'S NEW MINISTRY

Madrid, July 6.—King Alfonso appointed a new ministry today, headed by Field Marshal Dominguez, who will also be minister of war.

GROVER CLEVELAND IS BETTER TODAY

Princeton, N. J., July 6.—Ex-President Grover Cleveland is better today and expects to recover quickly.

NEW ZEALAND OFFICIAL WITH TEDDY

Oyster Bay, July 6.—Sir Joseph Ward, postmaster general of New Zealand, is the guest of the president today.

NO PRISON FOR REBATING RAILROADS SAYS FEDERAL COURT

Judge Holds That Elkins Law Cannot Be Retroactive and Therefore Defendants Can Only Be Fined If Convicted - At Chicago Judge Landis Held Eight Counts of Indictment Against Railroad To Be Good

New York, July 6.—The federal court today quashed the indictments, so far as the conspiracy charges are concerned, against all the railroads accused of giving rebates to the sugar trust. This is because the Elkins law is not retroactive. Although the other indictments charging rebating are upheld, a prison sentence is now impossible, and if guilty they can only be fined.

SOME ARE SUSTAINED.

Chicago, July 6.—Federal Judge Landis this morning sustained the first eight counts in the indictment charging the Alton railroad and its

agent, John N. Faithorne and Fred A. Wann, with giving rebates to Schwarzschild & Seltzer, packers. The court declared that the payment of dollar truckage fees for every car taken over the Schwarzschild & Seltzer track was clearly a rebate in violation of the Elkins law, and the jury was instructed to find accordingly. The court declared the last two counts regarding the repayment of passenger fares faulty and ordered them dismissed.

The jury found Faithorne and Wann, of the Alton, guilty according to the instructions of the court. A motion for a new trial will be argued tomorrow.

INSURANCE AFFAIRS BAD SAYS ATWOOD

San Francisco, July 6.—H. F. Atwood, of New York, chairman of the Underwriters' adjustment bureau, in an interview this morning declared that "Unless the business men and big banking institutions in San Francisco wake up and meet the insurance companies fairly the country is going to be swept by a financial cataclysm." The insurance situation, he said, is bad, but he refused to say if any failures were imminent. He declared he was not accusing the financial institutions of being responsible for the delays in insurance settlement, but reiterated that they must wake up.

SACRAMENTO IS HIGHER THAN EVER

Stockton, July 6.—The river is alarmingly high at Orwood this morning, being four inches higher than ever before in the history of California. It is believed that Victory and the middle division of Union Island is doomed to be entirely destroyed.

BRYAN DINED BY MAJOR BACON

London, July 6.—W. J. Bryan dined today with Major Bacon, the American military attaché. He met war Secretary Haldane, Paul Morton, D. O. Mills and other prominent Americans when he was entertained by Ambassador Reid.

COMPANY WILL INSURE INSURED

London, July 6.—An insurance company has been organized here with an advertised capital of a million pounds, to guarantee the face value of American life company policies. The premium is two shillings per hundred pounds of insurance.

ANARCHIST IS SENT TO PRISON

Berlin, July 6.—An anarchist named Rosenberg, believed to have come here in connection with a plot to assassinate the kaiser, was arrested upon his arrival from America today.

DEPUTIES FREELY ATTACK GOVERNMENT

During Discussion of Bialystok Massacre In Douma the Czar's Course Is Bitterly Assailed - Soldiers Murdered Defenseless Jews, It Is Asserted

St. Petersburg, July 6.—With freedom, venom and bitterness the deputies attacked the government in the Douma today during a discussion of the Bialystok massacre. Deputy Jacobson cited an appalling list of outrages against a defenseless people committed by soldiers, and declared that it was upon orders of the government, and said the government's apparent appeal for order was really an insidious incitement to further bloodshed.
