NEW FRANCHISE

NOW READY TO BE TAKEN UP

It is Said to Be Agreeable to the Council and Company Alike-- Council Will Meet Next Monday Night at Which Time Action Will Probably Be Taken

The city council will meet next Monday night, at which time the electric railway franchise will again be discussed and it is thought that some action will be taken at this time. The committees from the Commercial Club and the Merchants' Protective Association, which have been working on this matter and which recently sent to other cities for copies of franchises from which a suitable franchise for Eugene could be drafted, have completed their work and the members think that the franchise drawn will be satisfactory to both the city council and the railway company. E. W. Hall, one of the managers of the company, while here a few days ago in the interests of the proposed franchise, was made acquainted with the provisions of the committee's franchise, and, it is said, agreed to everything. It is thought that the council will take kindly to the franchise and grant it at once. While its provisions have not yet been made public, it is said the new franchise requires the company to put up a bond of \$5000 and to build a line to Springfield. The matter of requiring a connection with a line to Portland has not been finally settled, but it is thought that the present activity of the company in preparing to construct its Salem-Portland line and with surveys between Salem and Eugene viewing out the route on up the valley, is sufficient guarantee of connection with Portland. The members of the council will hold an informal meeting between now and Monday night to discuss the franchise.

NEW MINING

CAMP MAY

BE OPENED

Gold Found by Eugene Men in the Coast Mountains Forty Miles West of Eugene--Assays Show Good Percentage of Yellow Metal--Gold Also Found at Hadleyville.

There are good prospects for opening up a rich gold mining district in the western end of Lane county. Since April of this year Messrs. S. Bondy, Scott and Howell, of this city, have been prospecting in the vicinity of Saddleback, a well-known mountain in the Coast Range, about 40 miles west of Eugene. They have located several claims and intend soon to incorporate a stock company and place the stock on the market to secure funds with which to work the property.

The point at which these men are now working is on the Glenada Wildcat road six miles from where it crosses the Siuslaw river. They have taken out quite a quantity of gold-bearing quartz, and assays made in Eugene recently show a very good percentage of the precious metal, the amount, however, not being given out for publication. One sample of quartz, about an inch thick, that has been displayed in Eugene, is nearly half pure gold, and it is said that other rich pieces have been taken out.

A shaft is now being sunk and it is expected that the ledge will be found to be much richer further beneath the surface of the ground.

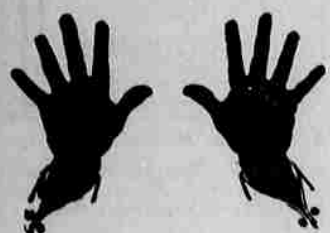

Changes in Pronunciation.

It requires no very profound knowledge of English literature to ascertain that the pronunciation of the language has undergone a vast change during the last three centuries. The shrewd conjecture has indeed more than once been hazarded that the works of the Elizabethan dramatist would be unintelligible to a modern audience if the native and original pronunciation were adhered to, and certain, at all events, it is that in many well-known passages of Shakespeare the very rhythm of the line imperatively demands a strange and unaccustomed accentuation of certain words. With the peculiarities of a later period most people are sufficiently acquainted. That gold was gold and that china was china during the Augustan era is matter of common knowledge. And who can forget Pope's description of Atticus: Dreading even fools, by flatterers beloved, And so obliging that he never obliged?

The last mentioned mode, as well as the two others, lingered on well into the last century and was habitual with Lord John Russell, though they are all probably by this time as rare as Rooshia for Russia and rarer than Spaw for Spa. Chambers' Journal.

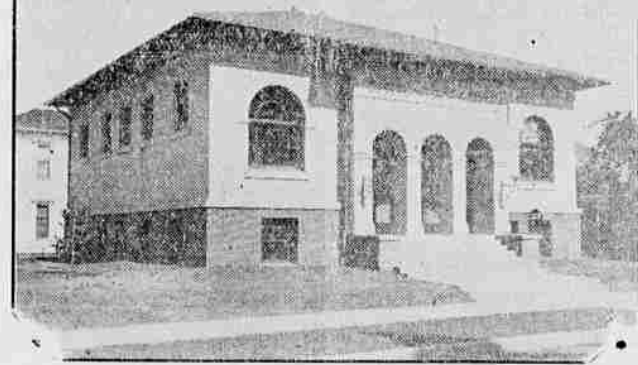
