OREGON BANKS HOLD MILLIONS OF PEOPLE'S MONEY

Latest Showing of National Institutions Gives Total Resources of Over Eighteen Millions - Deposits Twelve and Half Millions

Washington, July 7.—The national banks of Oregon have resources of \$17,534,603, according to the statements received today in response to the call of the comptroller for June 18th. Loans and discounts are nearly \$9,000,000.

The capital stock of all Oregon national banks is \$2,210,000, the surplus and undivided profits \$1,183,095. The banks carried a little over \$12,500,000 of individual deposits and a reserve of 34 per cent.

MAY ARBITRATE BIG SAILORS' STRIKE

San Francisco, July 7.—It was learned this morning that the ship-owners have at last decided to arbitrate the sailors' strike, and that a meeting to this end will be called by the mayor Monday. According to the report the owners have asked the mayor to present a third letter asking for arbitration, which will be considered favorably.

INSANITY DEFENSE IS LAST RESOURCE

New York, July 7.—It is intimated that Harry K. Thaw's attorney will be forced to abandon the defense of emotional insanity and attempt to prove the defendant now insane. It is admitted that not one bit of legal evidence can be produced to substantiate the plea of justification by the continued persecution of Thaw and his wife by White.

CALIFORNIA FLOOD WORST IN HISTORY

Stockton, Cal., July 7.—Before tomorrow morning more of the big reclamation works west of the city will be flooded. The San Joaquin river is falling at up-river points, but rising steadily about the threatened islands. The old river at Clinton court is three inches higher than ever before known.

RUSSIAN SAILORS DESERT THEIR SHIP

Vago, Spain, July 7.—Two hundred sailors on the Russian cruiser Terck in the harbor rebelled today. Many dressed in civil clothes and left the ship, while others were checked by the officers with revolvers. The crew rebelled previously at Suez.

ARCHITECT BUSY ON NEW BUILDINGS

Washington, July 7.—The supervising architect of the treasury is busily planning the new buildings authorized by congress.

The battleship Texas, known as the "hoodoo," will be retired from active service and used as receiving ship at Charleston.

PUTER SAYS HE GOT HIS MEDICINE

Portland, July 7.—S. A. D. Puter, the land fraudster, who was sentenced by Judge Wolverton to two years' imprisonment and a fine of \$7500, says: "I got my dose of medicine. That's all I've got to say."

SHERIFF WATCHES FOR HEAD OF OIL TRUST ARMED WITH WARRANT

John D. Rockefeller Will Be Nabbed By Officer of Law If He Shows Up at Cleveland Home---Alton Railroad Pleads That Rebates It Gave Were Only Customary, and If Proven Other Roads Will Be Prosecuted For Same Offense

Findlay, O., July 7.—Armed with a warrant for Rockefeller's arrest, Sheriff Groves has gone to Cleveland prepared for an indefinite stay as long as there is any hope of John D.'s return. Judge Banker, who will hear the anti-trust case against Rockefeller, is regarded as fearless in the discharge of his duty.

SAY IT WAS CUSTOMARY.
Chicago, July 7.—Attorneys for the Alton this morning declared it the custom among railroads to pay such rebates as the Alton was convicted of giving. The court said that if such a

custom can be proven it will mitigate the punishment. Attorney Morrison responded that if it is proven there will be more prosecutions of railroads. The case was continued until Wednesday.

DRAWING INDICTMENTS.
Cleveland, July 7.—Special Assistant Attorney General Pugin is here to assist in drawing the indictments against the Standard Oil trust in advance of the grand jury's report. Pugin will visit other cities where the Standard investigation is to be made for the same purpose.

PROPOSALS FOR GOVERNMENT BUILDING SITE

Washington, July 7.—The treasury department will open proposals for a site for a public building at Eugene, Oregon, August 8.

It is understood that the Commercial Club will meet next Tuesday evening to discuss the matter of location of the new building. Quite likely a number of proposals will be submitted to the treasury officials from which to make their selection.

DEATH OF MRS. FANNIE GILBERT

Mrs. Fannie Gilbert, wife of C. G. Gilbert, died at her home, 613 East Eleventh street, Friday evening at 8:25 o'clock, of stomach trouble. She was aged 50 years.

Mrs. Gilbert came here with her family from Fairfield, Nebraska, 15 years ago, and has lived in and near Eugene during that time. She was a member of the Free Methodist church at Springfield. Besides her husband she leaves two sons and four daughters. The sons are William A. and John, and the daughters Mrs. Mary Wheat, of Moro, Oregon; Viola, Daisy and Nellie, of Eugene. She has a sister, Mrs. Collette, and two brothers, George and Thomas Glass, living in Nebraska.

The funeral was held this afternoon at three o'clock, with interment in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

Marvin Hammett was today appointed administrator of the estate of L. P. Fawcett, who died at Donna May 25, 1906. The estimated value of the property of the estate is \$2500. J. M. Stafford, Frank Stafford and Jacob Nicholson were appointed appraisers.

H. M. Millhorn, Frank Moorhead and W. P. Christensen, appraisers of the property of the estate of Mads Anderson, deceased, have filed their inventory, showing property to the value of \$1024.98.

J. S. Milne, Geo. Atkinson and J. E. Young, appraisers of the property of the estate of Solomon Alapaugh, deceased, filed property valued at \$1000.05.

TAFT CONFERS WITH PRESIDENT ON ARMY AFFAIRS

Oyster Bay, July 7.—Secretary Taft had a conference with the president this morning and discussed the Panama canal and the army in the Philippines. On the latter subject they went over the president's plan to enlarge the number of posts and garrisons there with at least a brigade, then give the brigadier generals something to do. Taft said he would like to have brigade posts on the Pacific coast, but cannot see now where they could be located. Nearly \$16,000,000 is available for the army's needs during the present year.

CROP PROSPECTS PROMISE WELL

J. A. Ebbert, in the Guard office today, says he never saw grain looking better at this time of the year. He does not think there is any probability of the crop going wrong between now and harvest. Harvesting early grain will commence July 20th to 25th.
