

CLAIMS TO HAVE DISCOVERED MUCH COAL

Inventor of An Instrument to Locate
Mineral Ledges Makes Demon-
stration at Spencer Butte Coal &
Petroleum Co's Property South-
west of the City

W. H. Whiteaker, of Portland, inventor of an instrument which it is claimed will locate mineral ledges, accompanied J. W. Zimmerman and other promoters of the Spencer Butte Coal & Petroleum Co. to the new coal mine southwest of the city yesterday. He was taken all over the company's grounds and the instrument demonstrated to the satisfaction of those who saw it work that coal and petroleum exist there in large quantities.

Mr. Whiteaker was not acquainted with the country—had never been there before and did not know the location of the ledges of coal already discovered.

A Guard reporter was informed today that when over these ledges the instrument was attracted, proving to the satisfaction of those who saw the demonstration that it was no fake. It is said a large body of coal was discovered by the aid of the instrument at a different place from where the company is now working, and exactly in the same locality in which a Southern Pacific expert about two years ago declared coal to exist. On the strength of this demonstration the company will delve in that locality and expects to find a large vein.

The reporter was also informed that by the aid of the instrument three veins and a large pool of oil were discovered.

A demonstration of the instrument was made this forenoon in the office of J. W. Zimmerman. The instrument was charged with a piece of coal and when placed in the vicinity of some coal on a table a vibration took place. It was the same way with oil. The inventor says that with what ever mineral the instrument is charged if a ledge or vein of the same mineral exists in the ground over which the instrument is carried the vibration takes place.

The contrivance consists of three magnetic batteries and some wires, one wire going around the operator's body and one magnet being held in each hand.

Various members of the coal company are enthusiastic over the alleged discoveries of the instrument, and on the strength of them hope to interest more capital in the enterprise.

PROFITABLE ROYAL ANN CHERRY TREE

Tom Brown has a large Royal Ann cherry tree at his residence, corner Lawrence and Eighth streets, that he picked 512 pounds of fruit from the other day, at four cents a pound bringing \$21.68. NIGHSWANDER ROAD PETITION DENIED

County Court Refuses to Aid Proposition Because of a Much More Largely Signed Remonstrance Against It.

The county commissioners' court today refused the application of F. M. Nighswander and others to open the new portion of the Glenada Wildcat road which was proposed to be built entirely in Lane county, a part of the old road extending into Douglas county. A remonstrance signed by twice the number of persons as signed the petition was presented, and this was the factor that influenced the court's decision. Mr. Nighswander and the other promoters of the road are not discouraged and intend to keep at the matter until a road is pushed clear through. When it is completed a wagon can travel from Eugene clear to the mouth of the Siuslaw river.

The remonstrators mostly reside along the old stage road and naturally do not want a competing road to the Siuslaw.

In the Kitchen.

Have as few articles about the sink as possible. The sink brush, pan scraper, dish mop and soap shaker may be hung above it, and you will also find it convenient to have the potato masher and a large spoon at hand. The latter, however, must be hung high, out of reach of all splash. If possible keep the salt box to the right of the range and as near to it as the construction of the kitchen will permit.

Potatoes Chambers.

Potatoes chambers are a novelty. Slice and crisp them precisely as for Saratoga potatoes. That is, slice them as thin as possible and drop them into ice water, afterward drying the slices between folds of a towel. Arrange the slices in a well buttered blanch tin with salt, pepper and bits of butter between the layers. Bake until well browned.

Bottled Puddings.

When making any sort of bottled pudding tie over the basin grease proof paper, such as the grocer wraps the butter in. Roll in the usual manner, but take care that the water does not come up to the top of the basin. This plan saves trouble, for each pudding has a fresh paper and the washing of pudding cloths is done away with.

Moist Hands.

Moist hands are ruinous to light colored gloves. A good remedy for the trouble is to bathe them frequently with a mixture composed of two ounces of cologne and one-quarter ounce of tincture of belladonna. After this is rubbed well into the hands they may be sprinkled with talcum powder.

A too hot oven may be quickly cooled by placing in it a basin of cold water. The steam from the water will not injure anything that may be cooking except puff pastry.

A small hole in china can be perfectly mended with plaster of paris. Mix very thin with water and drop into the hole. Let it harden before using.

The B. S. Kelsay Mining Co. is busily employed sinking a shaft 5 1/2 by 8 feet on their property on Rock creek, a tributary of the Coast Fork from the east, fifteen miles southeasterly from Eugene.

The ledge, which carries copper and silver values, is a big one, showing a hundred feet wide on the surface. Five hundred pounds of the ore was shipped to the Tacoma smelter for a working test the other day. The company consists of A. W.
