LOGGING BUSINESS IN LANE COUNTY IS VERY ACTIVE

Booth-Kelly Company Alone Has 21,000,000 Feet on Way to Mills--Sawmills and Camps Resume Operations Monday After Week's Layoff - Fire Rangers at Work

The Booth-Kelly sawmills and logging camps and drives will all resume operations next Monday, after the usual Fourth of July shutdown of a week's duration. A full force of men will be put to work again, and the absence of those who quit because the county went "dry" will not be felt. A reporter called at the Booth-Kelly office this forenoon and was given several interesting logging items as follows:

The Spaulding Logging Company's drive of 6,000,000 feet, coming down the McKenzie, is now at the mouth of the Mohawk. Three million feet of these logs consists of cottonwood and maple, and the other 3,000,000 are fir. The Spaulding company furnishes logs for several mills down the valley and the paper mill at Oregon City. The Booth-Kelly drive on the McKenzie, for the Coburg mill, is now a short distance below Major Forrest's place, which is about 22 miles from Eugene. There are 7,000,000 feet of fir logs in this drive.

C. L. Williams' drive of 3,000,000 feet for the Eugene Lumber Co., has reached the head of the millrace, between here and Springfield, and will be in the boom at the mill within a few days.

The Booth-Kelly Fall Creek drive of 7,000,000 feet for the Springfield mill is now at the Unity bridge, 18 miles from here. Hills Bros' drive of 7,000,000 feet for the Springfield mill is between Hyland's ferry and the mouth of Fall creek.

FIRE RANGERS BUSY.

The seven fire rangers employed jointly by the Booth-Kelly Co., the Weyerhaeuser and Wentworth interests, the Sothern Pacific Company and about 50 individual holders of timber lands, and legally appointed by the county court, have been sworn in and began their duties on July 1. The rangers and the districts which they patrol are as follows: Austin Root, Mohawk district; S. K. Lewis, McKenzie valley; Faye Abrams, Fall Creek and upper Willamette districts; D. H. Brumbaugh and John Palmer, Rowle river and Brumbaugh creek districts.

Besides these John Burkhardt, ranger for Wells Gilbert, of Golden, Wash., who recently purchased a large acreage of timber land from Frances Canfield in township 16 south of range two east, up the McKenzie. With these rangers actively at work it is expected that destructive fires will be prevented.

of the Union block, Stark and First, when the smoke from a fire in the basement filled the upper stories almost to suffocation.

The landlady was certain that all her roomers had escaped but Dale, and two policemen groped their way upstairs and found him almost unconscious. Though almost blinded themselves by the smoke they managed to get him downstairs to the street, where he soon recovered.
