Granting of the Franchise

That was a good job the council did last night when they granted the long-pending franchise for an electric street railway. Much of the credit for the successful outcome of the hard struggle of the enterprising element of the city against the alluring sentiment that sought to block progress is due to the efforts of the joint committee from the Commercial Club and Merchants' Protective Association. They labored earnestly and faithfully to bring the contending factions together with the result that a franchise has been passed that provides a profitable opportunity for the investment of capital without forfeiting any of the vested rights of the people.

The Guard thinks that it is entitled to a share of the credit also. If the action taken last night leads to the consummation of the most important enterprise yet undertaken in this community, its position in the question has been plain and outspoken, and had inception in the desire to see the city in which it is published grow and prosper. The strongest plank in the platform of principles which constitutes the policy of this paper is loyalty to the interests of Eugene and Lane county—first, last and all the time. The Guard can take such a course because it is absolutely untrammelled financially and other wise. Its owners are known to the public, and they alone direct its policy and it has no interest to serve except those of the people upon whose liberal support and patronage it relies. No paper is more outspoken upon questions of corporation greed, railroad discrimination or other kindred matters, and it cares not a snap of the fingers for the good opinion of the Willamette Valley Co. or any other corporation if to secure it requires on our part the advocacy of a single measure inimical to the welfare of the public.

The Guard advocated the granting of this franchise, hedged about by the proper safeguards of the people's rights, because the investment of capital in such enterprises is necessary for the growth of the city and the territory centering its trade here; for the development of latent resources and to attract population with its attendant increase in business; for the ultimate construction of competing transportation lines that will have the effect of reducing the burden of unreasonable freight tariffs throughout the Willamette valley.

A witness in the Crofield trial over at Seattle testified how the Holy Roller prophet looked out for the main chance. He wanted the witness, a member of his flock, to sell an automobile he had and other valuables and give the money to him, asserting that God had directed that he do so. The convert had some sense left and didn't do it. Prophet Dowle, back in Illinois, had a larger field and better luck. His dupes for a time could not give of their accumulations too fast. They are repenting at leisure. It is singular that otherwise sensible men and women should be carried away by representations and claims that looked at in the light of sober reason show barefaced fraud.

It's a little warm but kicking about it only provokes perspiration. In the meantime the farmers are gathering in a big crop of hay, and grain is ripening in the glorious sunshine.

There are other places than Oregon where the red liquor that maketh an undue thirst and longing for icewater the next morning after, is having ad-

verse legislation. One would not think it, but it is the land of the mosquito, New Jersey, that is putting the iron heel down. Side and rear rooms and partitions are prohibited. The traffic must all be carried on in one room, and to make Sunday closing effective all screens and curtains on doors and windows must be removed. Selling liquor to a minor works forfeiture of license.

It never rains but it pours. The Guard tells about the granting of the electric railway franchise today, and along with it comes the news that the Oregon & Coast railroad has practically completed its arrangements to build from Portland to Eugene, and that the Oregon & Southeastern, now extending from Cottage Grove to Bozemia, is anxious to build its line to this city.

The Guard's long-delayed new press reached Eugene yesterday and will be set up at once. This machine, with a new job press and a large assortment of type and material, for which orders were given some time ago, will give the Guard facilities for doing its work second to none in Oregon, outside of Portland.
