WORK ON EUGENE- SPRINGFIELD LINE. TO BEGIN SOON

Manager Welch Says Just As Quick As New Water Plants Are Completed

Which Will Be in About Six Weeks
—Electric Road Between Eugene
and Springfield Will Cost
\$250,000.—Willamette Valley
Co. Spending Million and a Half

The Willamette Valley Company, of which Addison Welch is president and Rhodes, Sinkler & Butcher, of Philadelphia, are eastern financial backers, is making an investment of money amounting to nearly \$1,500,000 in the Willamette valley in development of electric light, power, water works, gas and street railway industries, says Wednesday's Portland Journal. They have purchased properties at Dallas, Eugene, Monmouth, Independence, Albany and Corvallis, and are securing franchises for street railways at Springfield and Eugene. Mr. Welch, who has been confined to a Portland hospital several weeks following a surgical operation, was able to leave the hospital today and took up his quarters at the Oregon Hotel.

"The Willamette valley looks good to us," he said, "and we believe it is a safe place for investment and susceptible of great industrial development. It will have a large population and continue to be a prosperous section of Oregon."

Mr. Welch said the Willamette Valley Company has just purchased the Dallas Electric Light and Independence Light & Power Companies, including the Monmouth equipment, for about \$160,000, and will expend \$40,000 in improvements. The Dallas plant, from which electric current will be supplied, will have a boiler capacity of 600 horsepower and dynamo capacity of 450 kilowatts.

IMPROVEMENTS UNDER WAY.

Electric power pumps and Roberts filters with capacity of 500,000 gallons every 24 hours will be installed at the Independence waterworks. Large improvements are also under way at the Eugene waterworks. The company is constructing a 1,500,000 gallon reservoir at Eugene and a 1,000,000-gallon reservoir at Independence. These will be filled by electric pumps drawing water from large wells.

EUGENE-SPRINGFIELD LINE.

"We expect to complete the Eugene and Springfield water-works in about six weeks. Help is scarce and hard to get in the interior towns," said Mr. Welch. "As soon as this work is done we will begin construction of the Eugene-Springfield car line."

IS BUILDING GAS PLANT.

The company is also building at Eugene a coal gas plant, which will be finished in about two months. The plant will have a capacity of 65,000 cubic feet daily, but the retorts are built for double that output for the future growth of the city. At Albany a water-power plant is being constructed for furnishing light and power for Albany and Corvallis. Power is secured from the company's 14-mile ditch connecting with the Santiam.

New wheels are being put in at Albany and a fine power plant will be installed. The Albany waterworks has been purchased by the Willamette Valley Company and improvements are being made. The company, it is said, expended \$800,000 in purchasing old plants, and is putting nearly \$200,000 into improvements. The Eugene-Springfield electric road will cost \$250,000 and this will bring the company's valley investments up to a figure close to \$1,500,000.

MISS HOFFMAN MARRIED IN PORTLAND

Miss Edith Hoffman, formerly of this city, was married in Portland last night to Professor Swanson, a dancing master, who several years ago conducted a dancing school in Eugene. They will reside at Bellingham, Wash., where Mr. Swanson owns considerable property. They will soon take a trip to Europe.

THOS. YOUNG, ESCAPED CONVICT, RECAPTURED

The following is a press dispatch from Vancouver, Wash., concerning Tom Young, who was sentenced to the penitentiary at Salem from Lane county four years ago and who escaped recently:

William Thomas, alias Thomas Young, captured by Sheriff Kirby, of Cowitz county, and sent to this city on a charge of horse stealing, supposed to have stolen the horse and buggy from W. S. Miller's stable, today confessed the crime to Prosecuting Attorney W. W. Sparks. He announced his intention to plead guilty before the court, and accordingly his plea was entered and he was sentenced to fourteen years in the state penitentiary.

Thomas also stated that he was an escaped convict, having escaped some time ago from Salem, Or., where he was confined under the name of Thomas Young.

Since his escape at horse stealing here, he committed the crime of house burglary in Cowitz county. When speaking of this latter crime today he said that he was driven to it from hunger. He said his intention in stealing the horse and buggy was to aid him in getting beyond the British Columbia line.
