METHOD OF SELECTING PUBLIC BUILDING SITE

Secretary of Treasury Shaw Makes Statement of Procedure - Bids For Sale or Donation to Be Advertised for in Local Newspapers

In view of the erection of a government postoffice building in Eugene, the sum of \$50,000 for that purpose having been recently appropriated by congress, the method employed by the treasury department in securing a site for the building is set forth in the following from Leslie M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury, just received by Postmaster J. L. Page:

Whenever an act of congress authorizes the acquisition of a site for a proposed public building—whether by purchase or gift—the treasury department invites, through an advertisement inserted in a local newspaper, bids for the sale, or propositions of donation, and directs that the same be submitted to the secretary of the treasury at Washington. This advertisement gives such information as to the approximate requirements as will enable intelligent preparation and submission of bids or offers.

The bids and offers obtained in this way are opened at the treasury department in Washington at the time stated in the advertisement, and as soon thereafter as practicable an agent of the department is sent to make a personal examination of the properties offered, and upon this report, together with representations in writing from other sources, the department makes selection, conditional, nevertheless, that the title to the property be approved by the attorney general. When the land is acquired on which buildings are to be erected, notice to remove the same is given after the land has been acquired and title approved.

Whenever the department is to obtain an acceptable site at a reasonable price in the manner outlined, it frequently makes condemnation proceedings in which the price to be paid is judicially determined.

As soon as practicable after the acquisition of the site, plans for the proposed building are prepared and a contract let for the construction thereof.

400 BARRELS OF COCKTAIL CHERRIES

Allen Canning Company Will Ship Preserved Royal Anns to the East—Large Force of Employees at the Cannery

At the Allen cannery there are 400 barrels of preserved Royal Ann cherries for shipment to the east. These cherries bring a fancy price in the Eastern markets and are used principally in cocktails and other fancy drinks. The Allen company has been shipping the cherries in this shape for several years and has built up a splendid trade.

About a dozen men and 35 women and girls are busy in the canning department. The crop of cherries this year is immense, and the run at the cannery will be longer than usual.

Some raspberries are now coming in at the cannery and they will be worked on from now until they are gone.

IMPORTED FILTER SAND LIKE SIUSLAW PRODUCT

The Willamette Valley Co. is unloading a car of sand for the new filters at the waterworks. It is shipped from California and has exactly the appearance of the sand on the beach near Florence.
