PUTTING STATE FAIR GROUNDS IN READINESS

More activity is in evidence on the state fair grounds at Salem than has ever been seen before, since the organization of the Oregon State Agricultural Commission. There are more rice horses on the grounds being trained and exercised than ever before, and the race meet promises to be the biggest and best ever held on the Pacific coast.

A large gang of prisoners from the state penitentiary are at work on the grounds and will be kept there until the entire premises are in perfect condition. Now fences are being built from the Southern Pacific railroad almost to the opposite side of the enclosure, and these, as well as all the buildings, pavilions, etc., will be painted. All the stables and cattle sheds are receiving a coat of whitewash, and the trees in the park are being treated in the same manner. The commissioners have reason to believe that the different counties in the state are going to send more and larger exhibits of their products than they have been doing on former occasions, and the aggregation of livestock and farm products will be the best ever seen in the state.

Exhibitors in the different counties have been notified that it will be advisable to send in all exhibits that are not perishable, with the end in view that they may be sent to the Jamestown exposition, and this will be the cause of great care taken in arranging some of the exhibits. Men and Teams Put To Work As Fast As They Can Be Procured --- Will Complete Line Between Salem and Chemawa By Time State Fair Opens in September

Work on the new line of the Willamette Valley Traction Company, between Salem and Portland, has actually begun, and there seems to be little doubt that cars will be running between Salem and the Indian training school at Chemawa by the opening of the state fair, September 10th. A considerable number of men and teams were put to work Wednesday on Broadway, in North Salem, and Thursday morning the number of men and teams was augmented by several additional gangs.
