TYPHOID FEVER

AT PENDLETON

Although there is considerable typhoid fever in Pendleton at this time, the disease is far from being as prevalent as current rumors would indicate. Within the past few days many wild stories have been told regarding the alarming number of cases within the city, one being that there are now 23 cases at the hospital alone.

This morning careful inquiry was made among the physicians, and it was learned that there are but seven or eight cases at the hospital, while the total number of patients there is less than 23.

In the opinion of Dr. Ringo there are now between 35 and 40 cases of typhoid in the city, whereas current reports indicate several times that number.

Of those who have the disease many have been brought to town from the adjoining country, nearly all of the hospital cases being from out of town.

Owing to the continued hot weather the doctors declare there is danger of a further spread of the disease, though at present the epidemic is at a standstill. Accordingly they advocate all possible precautions against the disease and especially urge that no water be used that has not been boiled.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
