RAY SUMNER DROWNED IN WILLAMETTE

Was in Swimming Sunday Afternoon When He Became Exhausted and Sank

Drowning Occurred About Mile and a Half Below the City—Body Recovered Soon Afterward—Boy Was Well-Known Student of High School

The treacherous Willamette river has claimed another victim, the third in this vicinity within two months.

Ray Sumner, aged 18 years, son of T. C. Sumner and a well known student of the Eugene high school, was drowned Sunday afternoon about five o'clock while swimming in the river about a mile and a half below the city. The unfortunate young man, who lived on the Irving road, not far from where he was drowned, was in bathing with Emil Kuest, Leon Ray, Arthur Beebe, Frank and Herman Koller, all neighbors of his and near his own a. C. They had been in the river quite a while when young Sumner, who was swimming down stream in the middle of the river, began calling for help and his companions saw by his struggles that he was in distress. He had been seized with cramps or become exhausted. Young Kuest swam out to where he was and attempted to assist him, but was nearly drowned himself. On account of the other boy's frantic struggles he could do nothing with him and was drawn under the water several times.

Sumner sunk to the bottom of the river and his companions attempted to dive to bring him to the surface, but being inexperienced could not reach him. They called for help and a number of men who, with their families, were spending the Sunday on the river bank near there, came to the rescue. They procured a boat and succeeded in taking the body out after it had been in the water probably 40 minutes. Among those in the boat were J. A. Hains and son Stephen, Norbert Ayn and Joseph Hanson. A physician was at once telephoned for and Dr. Geo. Wall arrived a few minutes afterward. In the meantime every effort was made at resuscitation and after the doctor arrived the work was continued under his direction. The body was worked with for a long time and everything possible done to produce signs of life but without success.

A party of men, including Chief of Police Farrington, Professor C. A. Burdon, Lou Warnock and a Guard reporter, went to the scene of the drowning in Geo. Graves' automobile, taking grappling hooks to assist in recovering the body, but it had been taken out of the water before they arrived.

The father of the young man, arrived probably an hour after the drowning and his grief was pitiful to behold. After all hope of resuscitation had been abandoned the body was taken home and prepared for burial. Mr. Sumner and family came here about a year and a half ago from Kansas, buying the Page and Rust farm below the city. The mother of the boy died only a few months ago, and besides his father he leaves a sister and two brothers. Ray would have graduated at the high school next year had he lived. He was a bright young man and won many friends during his short residence in this vicinity. His classmates and school associates are deeply grieved over his sudden death.

Funeral arrangements will be made as soon as the two brothers arrive from California.
