WILL BE IN LANE COUNTY SOON

Right-of-Way Agents for the Oregon Coast & Eastern Railway Coming This Way

Harry W. Graham, who is employed by the Oregon Coast & Eastern Railway Co. securing rights of way for the proposed line, is in Eugene today. He has been working lately in Washington and Yamhill counties and says the people in that section are very favorable to the project. There is no great amount of trouble in securing rights of way in any section of the country as the deeds for the land are placed in escrow in a Portland bank and are not delivered to the company until the railroad is completed.

Mr. Graham says the several crews of surveyors for the coast line are making good progress. He says the right of way men will be at work in Lane county within a short time.

TO ABOLISH TOOTH AS ELKS' EMBLEM

There is a possibility that the present national convention of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, now in session at Denver this week, will take decisive action to abolish the elk tooth as the emblem of that order. The Elks of Colorado are behind the movement, and as there are twenty-one lodges of the order in that state they expect to be successful in their efforts.

One of the leaders in the movement is John A. McGuire, editor of Outdoor Life, a well-known sporting paper of Denver. He states that a concerted move is to be made by the sportsmen of the Western states to have the grand lodge take some action toward either completely abolishing the use of teeth in the future or at least discourage the practice. He declares that it is a fact that many trappers and hunters in Wyoming and Utah make a specialty of killing both bull and cow elks for the purpose of securing teeth. He states that the carcasses are left to rot after the teeth are removed.

Each elk has but two teeth and it is said that at least one out of every three members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks wears elk teeth charms. There are 250,000 members of the order in the United States and it is apparent that an enormous number of teeth are used. If the grand lodge decides to abolish the emblem the action will probably not refer to those who now own elk teeth, but to any future acquirement of them.

DECISIONS IN SEVERAL DIVORCE CASES

Neither One of the Gossers Given a Decree - Mrs. Lulu M. Baker Is Given Her Freedom

Judge Harris yesterday afternoon rendered a decision in the divorce case of Nellie E. Gosser against Fred P. Gosser, which has attracted a good deal of attention in the circuit court because of the scandalous testimony and because of a cross complaint filed by the husband. The judge decrees that neither party is entitled to a divorce and that neither shall have judgment against the other for costs and disbursements. Gosser and his wife reside in the vicinity of Blachley.

In the case of Lulu M. Baker against Claire Baker, the plaintiff is granted a divorce, the custody of their minor daughter, Creta N., and \$10 a month from the defendant for the support, nurture and education of the child.

In the case of Bessie E. Palmer against Jerome Palmer the defendant is ordered to pay the plaintiff \$25 each month until further order of the court, and to pay the costs and disbursements of the suit.
