ALL WATER NOW PASSES THROUGH THE FILTERS

Old Pumping Plant Idle Today for First Time in Years and New Pumps Are Now in Commission—Water Is Now Practically Pure

For the first time since the new pumping station has been completed the old plant at the foot of East Sixth street, which has done duty for years, is idle today and will hereafter remain so except in case of an emergency or an accident at the new plant. All the water now pumped into the reservoir or into the mains passes through the filters and is therefore comparatively pure and safe to drink.

Many people have been drinking the water anyway during the past few weeks and as far as known have suffered no ill effects from it. It is believed that the typhoid fever germs have been entirely eliminated from the water and now that the filters are in use there would seem to be no danger at all.

The new plant, which is located near the foot of East Eighth street, is complete in every particular. The two mammoth pumps in use at the plant are operated by electricity.

EXTENSIVE REPAIRS TO MATLOCK BLOCK

Modern Front Will Be Put in, Interior Remodelled—Several Prospective New Tenants—E. Hanson Moves Out

J. D. Matlock, who owns the three-story Matlock building at Eighth and Willamette streets, will expend several hundred dollars on improvements to the building this summer beginning the work just as soon as E. Hanson moves his clothing store out, which will be before the first of August. A modern front will be put in and alterations made in the interior of the building.

Mr. Matlock says he has two or three applications for occupancy of the store room, but has not yet decided who he will let occupy it. The location is about the best one in the city for almost any kind of business and when it became known that Mr. Hanson was going to move out several were anxious to secure it. It is understood that the room rents for \$100 a month.

WEEKLY BULLETIN ON OREGON WEATHER

Feature of Past Week Was Excessively High Temperature But Cooler and Cloudy During Last Day or Two

The feature of the week was the excessively high temperatures that prevailed up to Monday, when it turned cooler in the western counties, but continued warm east of the Cascade Mountains. There was only one hot day in the coast counties, but elsewhere maximum temperatures of over 90 degrees were common and in a few localities maximum temperatures of over one hundred degrees occurred. No rain of consequence was reported, and that which fell was in the form of small showers, that were heaviest in the Cascade and Blue Mountains. Foggy nights and mornings prevailed in the coast counties. The winds were generally light and mostly from the northwest.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Portland, Multnomah county.—The weather was dry and very warm, with maximum temperatures above 90 degrees on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. It was cloudy and cooler the last day of the week.

Forest Grove, Washington county.—The weather during the week was dry and very warm, the highest temperature of the year, 103 degrees, being recorded on Thursday, the 12th.

Aurora P. O., Clackamas county.—Excessively warm weather prevailed during the latter part of the week. The winds were from the north and west. A thunderstorm occurred on Thursday night, the 12th, but was unaccompanied by rain.

Corvallis, Benton county.—The weather during the week was very warm and dry, the warmest day being Thursday, when a temperature of 100 degrees was recorded.

Crawfordsville, Linn county.—The entire week was very warm, the temperature ranging from 90 degrees to 104 degrees. The atmosphere, owing to the great heat, was very oppressive.
