SOME FINE ORE FOUND AT GREAT NORTHERN

Stamp Mill Resumes Operations Today After Having Been Closed Down For Several Weeks

Attorney W. J. Hooker, who returned this forenoon from a trip to the Great Northern mine in the Blue River district, informs the Guard that the stamp mill at the mine which has been idle for three or four weeks was to have resumed operations today and would continue to run steadily. Mr. Hooker reports the miners are now working in splendid ore, better than has been encountered for a long time, and the mill will be grinding out brekks of the yellow metal at a rapid rate for some time to come.

BIG LOG DRIVE ARRIVES AT SPRINGFIELD

The 7,000,000 foot drive of fir logs brought down from the North Fork by J. B. Hills arrived at the Booth-Kelly mill at Springfield yesterday and was safely landed in the pond.

The river is now at a good logging stage, much better than usual at this time of the year, the late rains having kept the water high.

NO BLIND PIGS DISCOVERED IN EUGENE

Rumors of Arrest Without Foundation—Officers and Anti-Saloon League Agents Are On Alert For Infractions of Law—Sheriff Makes Trip To Cottage Grove

Several rumors of arrests for violating the prohibition law in Eugene have been in circulation for the past few days, but they are without foundation. However, the officers and agents of the anti-saloon league have been on a sharp lookout for illegal selling of liquor since the first of July and it is declared by them that the first man caught violating the law will be severely dealt with.

It is known that liquor has been obtained here since the law went into effect, but to ascertain where it came from is the question to be settled. As is the case in all communities where prohibition exists, liquor will continue to be sold in greater or less quantities, but it is probable that very few if any arrests will be made.

It is said that at least one former liquor dealer has been suspected of violating the law and for some time his place was closely watched. His doors are now closed and he is out of the city.

Sheriff Fisk made a trip to Cottage Grove last night for the purpose, so it is said, of looking into conditions in that city, although when queried as to the object of his trip he was non-committal. He returned this afternoon and when asked if there was "anything doing," replied no.

TWENTY-STAMP QUARTZ MILL FOR NORTH FAIRVIEW

Company Has Purchased the Entire Noonday Plant, One of the Best In This Part of the State - Will Install as Soon as Possible

L. N. Roney, president, Alf Walker vice president, Herbert Leigh, general manager, and George Midgley, all directors of the North Fairview Mining Co., returned yesterday from a trip of inspection of their properties in the Bohemia district.

The North Fairview mine has been worked steadily through the winter and spring and large quantities of milling ore have been opened up. This company now owns the Cracker-jack group of four claims adjoining the Helena mine on the east, in addition to the original group.

A deal has been closed and deeds passed whereby the North Fairview Company becomes sole owner of the Noonday 20-stamp mill and entire equipment, costing upward of \$30,000. This is one of the best mills in the state and practically new. All or part of this machinery will be installed on the North Fairview property as soon as possible.

In the meantime arrangements are being completed to mill the ore of the N. rth Fairview mine at the Crystal stamp mill, which is situated only 100 feet north of their side line.

CAMP IS LIVELY.

The members of the party found the camp lively and all are more than pleased with the outlook in the district. The Oregon Securities Company's 30-stamp mill is pounding away night and day and other plants are busy. When the mill just acquired by the North Fairview Company starts running every mill in the district will be in operation.

PORTLAND MARKETS.
Front Street, July 18.—The principal features of the Portland wholesale market today are:
Hop contracts at 11c.
Several cars watermelons unloaded. Asparagus delivery to be short. Several cars lemons are unloaded. Peach plums come from Freewater. Celery is coming from the north. Local tomatoes are lower. Salmon catches remain small. Better demand for chittim bark. Eggs and poultry hold unchanged.
HOP CONTRACTS AT ELEVEN CENTS.
Dealers are making endeavors to land a considerable number of contracts on the coming hop crop, with 11 cents being freely offered today for the best grades. Never has the hop market shown such a firm tone during the past twelve months as today. The English crop continues to show a deterioration in quality and quantity and other places in Europe are not showing a very good condition. In the Willamette valley the continued warm weather has had a bad effect on the vines. The size of the arms has been shortened considerably, and although quality will not likely be short of that of a year ago, estimates for the coming crop are being pulled down considerably. This condition is not confined to any one section of the state, but yards in all districts clearly show the effects of too much sun. In parts of Washington to the same condition exists, the only difference there being in districts that are irrigated. Lice are now practically unknown in the yards. There is much fear of rain now and a wet harvest later on. This will have a more depressing influence upon the production and a bullish tendency as to prices. In any event dealers are willing to take chances on contracts at higher values.

CHITTIM BARK DEMAND BETTER
Advices received by the Journal indicate that there has been a resumption of the demand for chittim bark and peeling operations have become general again in most sections. As high as 4 1/2c was reported paid in some sections by small dealers, but the high figure here at present is 4c for 1906 bark.
