THOMPSON MAY HAVE BROUGHT NEWS TO MARIE

Portland Journal Thinks Arrival of Mrs. McKinley in Eugene Immediately After Attorney Thompson's Return From the Orient Is Significant

The presence of Marie Ware McKinley, wife of Horace McKinley, fugitive land thief, in Eugene, Oregon, at this time may be due to something more than a desire to visit relatives and friends, says the Portland Journal. There are some persons who believe that her stopover on the way to Portland was mainly for the purpose of getting word from her absent husband. This belief arises from the coincidence that H. W. Thompson, an attorney, reported to have been engaged as counsel by McKinley, returned to Eugene from a trip to the Orient just before the wife of the fugitive came to town.

When last heard of McKinley, who eloped to the Orient with a dancer known as "Little Egypt," was in China. Thompson is saying nothing, but it is believed that he saw McKinley while away and brought back a message to the deserted wife. Mrs. McKinley bears her husband no ill will for leaving her. She has often declared that the story of his elopement is false, and officers of the law who have sought to find the fugitive are of the opinion that husband and wife are communicating with each other at every possible opportunity.

ENJOYING HER VISIT.

Mrs. McKinley, according to reports from Eugene, is enjoying her visit, and finds social calls more interesting than discussion of land frauds. She has nothing to say regarding the whereabouts of her husband, but is keeping close watch on the progress of land fraud prosecutions. She is under instructions to appear here July 24 as a witness for the government in the trial of Franklin Pierce Mays, who was mixed up with McKinley, Pater and others in several unsavory land deals.

McKINLEY AND CHINESE GIRLS.

Not long after McKinley disappeared a letter bearing his signature came out of China to a man in San Francisco. Inclosed was a chatty missive was a fine photograph showing the gay and debonaire Horace with four Chinese belles. It was hard to tell which of the five was smiling the blindest. Horace seemed perfectly at home, and the belles—they were delighted. Evidently they believed that the Celestial Kingdom had received a decided acquisition. At that accounts the picture was in the possession of Mrs. McKinley. She never was of a jealous disposition.

MUCH MONEY DISTRIBUTED AMONG ALBANY PEOPLE

The Deschutes Lumber Co. by its agent, J. E. Ryan, last evening and today has delivered forty or fifty checks for the Klamath timber claims sold by Albany people, and will continue to do so until the claims are all taken of those who have agreed to sell, about 130 in all, which will put in circulation about \$200,000 in and around Albany. Each check is for \$1517.50, being \$1000 less 5 per cent commission and \$2.50 for the abstracts. The deal will mean a good deal for Albany with its \$100,000 to \$200,000 turned loose in the commerce of the city.—Democrat.

EXPERT'S REPORT ON COAL MINE

Robert H. Spencer, who was recently sent from Portland by a capitalists to examine the Spencer Butte Coal & Petroleum Co.'s coal mine southwest of the city, has made the following report:

The coal property of the Spencer Butte Coal & Petroleum Company is situated about eleven miles southwest of the town of Eugene, Oregon, in the foothills of the Cascade range of mountains.

The coal bearing formation of slate, sandstone and fine clay extends over a considerable area; of country well in place, no apparent signs being present of an eruption or any disturbance of volcanic nature.

There are surface croppings showing three distinct veins of coal, the two upper croppings measuring approximately six feet in thickness, the third and lower cropping not being measurable. The veins run north and south, dipping to the west at an angle of 30 degrees. An analysis on sample taken from the surface of the first or upper vein gave the following results:

This is a bituminous coal, comparing favorably with all of the best coal mined on the Pacific coast and will in my opinion improve greatly both in quality and substance of the vein after a depth of from 200 to 400 feet has been reached.

The development consists of an inclined shaft 30 feet in depth, which it is estimated will tap the second vein at a depth of 110 feet, and a tunnel driven 87 feet, crosscutting the vein, with a 30 foot wing at the face.

The shaft and hoist is admirably located for permanent working on a large scale, ample room being allowed for tipples and bunkers. As soon as operations warrant it a spur could be run to the Southern Pacific railroad, but nine miles distant, at a small cost and on approximately a maximum grade of one per cent.

An ample supply of timber and water for all mining purposes for years to come is on the property of the company. The development work is being ably done on scientific principles under the direction of J. W. Mitchell.

Summary.—Considering the excellent formation, in nearly every way similar to that of the best coal fields of the world and the number and extent of the coal croppings of superior quality determined by analysis, this company has every reason to expect, in my opinion, to encounter large and permanent bodies of coal of much better quality than can be determined by surface indications only.
