ANOTHER ELECTRIC PLANT FOR EUGENE

This gentleman says that the Michigan men are entirely able to build and operate such a plant and if the outlook suits them they will lose no time in putting it in. ## WATER FLOWS FROM TOP OF WELL

At Depth of 49 Feet Drill Encountered Strong Vein--Flowed for Three Hours Yesterday Afternoon

Archie-lan water may be found in Eugene. While drilling a well for Mr. Anderson on his lot at West Thirtieth and Charnelton streets yesterday afternoon, G. W. Taylor encountered a strong vein of water which came to the top of the well and overflowed for three hours. As the drill went further down the flow ceased but at noon today at a depth of about 70 feet the water was within six or eight feet of the surface. At the time the water overflowed the drill was down only about 49 feet. It is believed that if the drill is sent down far enough a good supply of artesian water may be found.
