RETURN EAST

President Wheeler, Secretary Hengen and Director Smith Visited Mines in Bohemia District and Express Themselves Well Pleased With Conditions

John W. Wheeler, of Orange, Mass., president of the Oregon Securities Co., operating in the Bohemia mining district, G. B. Hengen, secretary, and Dr. Herbert E. Smith, member of the board of directors, also member of the executive board, left this week for their respective homes, after making an extensive inspection of the year's development and general operations of the mine.

The gentlemen express themselves well pleased with the conditions of the mine and the last year's operations. The development of the big property has been steadily advanced throughout the year and is now going on with a rush. The stamps have been dropping steadily for nearly a year now, with good results on ore that is running a little better than 80 per ton, average. During this time many hundred feet of tunnel work has been done on the Champion lead, and in driving this tunnel the ore thus removed has been milled, although the principal ore milled since early in the spring is from the Musick, brought over into the Champion side, where the mill is located, by means of the electric tram, which is working to the utmost satisfaction of the management.

During the month of June 145 tons of Champion ore was milled, as well as 1000 tons of Musick. The management is confident that from now on it will not fall below the 1000 ton mark, and is making every effort to reach the 2000 ton mark this month. Under the superintendency of Captain Eade, who took charge of the property in the early spring, most satisfactory results have been attained. A. B. Wood, manager for the company, is always modest in his comments, but he expresses himself pleased with the outlook, and says he feels the officials left the camp this week in full appreciation of that which has and is being done. -Western Oregon.
