ATTEMPTED TO ESCAPE

John C. Barnes Sentenced by Judge Harris to Hang Dashes for Liberty

Being Taken to Salem by Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff of Douglas County on Train Makes Bolt For Door - Passed Through Eugene This Afternoon

John C. Barnes, a convicted murderer, sentenced by Judge Harris at Roseburg this morning to hang September 18 for the murder of Wm. H. Graham, was taken to Salem today by Sheriff H. T. McClellan and Deputy Sheriff H. C. Slocum, passing through Eugene on the afternoon train. Shortly after the train left Roseburg this forenoon Barnes, who was sitting in a seat in the smoking car with the sheriff, made a desperate attempt to escape. Taking advantage of a momentary relaxation of vigilance on the part of the sheriff, the prisoner made a wild dash down the aisle toward the car door and succeeded in reaching it, but before it could be opened the sheriff had him by the collar and dragged him back to his seat. During the remainder of the trip the precaution was taken to handcuff the prisoner to the deputy sheriff.

Barnes was previously sentenced to hang and he was taken to the penitentiary, but the case was appealed to the supreme court and a new trial denied, necessitating another sentence.

EARLY DAY LANDMARK

BEING REMOVED

The tumbledown residence at the corner of East Eleventh and Mill streets, known as the old Shaw house, is being torn down by Rev. E. A. Child, who with his family, is camped on the lot for the summer. The house will probably be replaced in the near future by a modern residence, one in keeping with the environs. Handsome and costly residences surround it on all sides and for many years it has been an eyesore to that section of the city.

An effort was made by a reporter today to get a correct history of the old building. As far as could be learned it was erected in the '50s by Hilyard Shaw, a pioneer who owned a large tract of land which is now the Eastern part of the city. Hilyard street was named in his honor. The old house was used as a residence continuously by many different persons until about three years ago, when it was abandoned and people living in that vicinity have been trying to get the owners to tear it down ever since.

During the course of demolition Mr. Child has found between the walls and behind the fireplace of the old shack many interesting relics of old-time days, including a spinning wheel, a musician's baton, some old coins and letters and newspapers. One paper, a musical journal printed in San Francisco in July, 1889, was left unopened. It was addressed to some one named Kineid, the initials not being legible.

Every one is glad to see the old house torn down, for it was certainly not a thing of beauty.

MUCH WORK BEING DONE AT BLUE RIVER

Treasure Stamp Mill Resumed Operations Under New Management --Development Work Being Done on an Extensive Scale at Number of Claims

H. B. Grove, who owns some rich properties in the Blue River mining district and who has been working them for the past seven or eight years, was in the city yesterday on his way to Portland where he went to transact some business connected with the mines.

In conversation with Guard representative last evening Mr. Grove stated that the twelve-stamp mill at the Treasure mine which C. H. Park

recently sold to a company of Englishmen is in operation, having been started up about a week ago. The new owners have a large force of men at work and are getting splendid results from the mill.

At the Hennessey group of claims, formerly the Blazer property, many improvements are being made. New trails are being cut, ground is being cleared for new buildings and much other work is being done. Mr. Hennessey, who is one of the old-timers of the district, now owns some of the richest claims in the whole camp. They include the Portland, the Oro Fino, the Top, the Top Knot, the L. X. L. and the Dove.

The sawmill which has heretofore been in operation at the Treasure mine has been moved to the Jap claim over on the Calapooia side and owned by the Treasure company.

Rungard is doing some good work on the Sunset claim and Beckner has started work on the Princess claim, known as the Dorris property.

Dr. C. I. Candiani, the Italian consul at Portland, who owns the Doctor and Almighty Dollar claims, is doing splendid work with his air drill, recently installed. He is now boring

into the mountain at the rate of six feet each day, whereas before the drill was installed the men were able to make only a foot or two of progress in the same length of time. When Mr. Grove left the mines Wednesday the drill was only ten feet from the ledge.

The Lucky Boy and Great Northern saw mills are ponding away regularly and the camp in general has a very lively appearance.
